1971 Congress in Beautiful West Virginia

The home of two of Chi Phi's newest chapters will be the site of the 143rd Congress of the Fraternity. Delta Xi located at West Virginia Wesleyan in Buckhannon, and Pi Delta at West Virginia University in Morgantown, will co-host the 1971 Congress. The Congress will convene on August 27th with all meetings being held at the Mont Chateau Lodge overlooking beautiful Cheat Lake in the Allegheny Mountains. The Herman C. Krannert Leadership Development Seminar, beginning on August 25th, will also be held at Mont Chateau Lodge which is operated by West Virginia University through an agreement with the West Virginia Department of Natural Resources.

The West Virginia University area is adjacent to the wilderness splendor of 13,000 acre Coopers Rock State Forest, with hiking trails, breath-taking scenic overlooks of the

rugged Cheat River Canyon, a restored iron furnace of pioneer days, and hunting and fishing. The 1800 acre Cheat Lake area provides all of the water sports plus hiking and horseback riding.

By car and by air, Mont Chateau and West Virginia University are easily accessible from Pittsburgh; Washington; Baltimore; Columbus, Ohio; Charleston and other eastern and western metropolitan centers. Allegheny Airlines serves the Morgantown Municipal Airport from Charleston, Pittsburgh and Washington.

Mont Chateau Lodge overlooking Cheat Lake, has 55 guest rooms, each with tub-shower combination. A sand beach and well supervised swimming area is available for overnight guests. Beside the Lodge, is the Conference Center, where the Chi Phi Congress will hold its

Indiana House Badly Damaged By Fire

A major fire destroyed the roof and top floor of the Iota Delta house, Monday, March 29, 1971. The first and second floors were badly damaged by water and smoke. It is estimated that the damage to the \$225,000 seven year old house and furnishings will exceed \$70,000.

The fire was discovered about 11:15 A.M. and was brought under control by noon. Safety Division patrolman alerted the Bloomington Fire Department. A few minutes later six trucks with 30 firemen answered the alarm. Shortly after noon, the roof collapsed into the third floor dormitory section about 12:10 P.M.

The majority of the 32 residents were attending classes, and no injuries were reported. Most of the members lost all of their personal possessions, although heroic efforts were made to remove personal articles. The dining room and living room furniture was saved by members and student volunteers.

Fire inspectors had voluntarily inspected the chapter house on March 23 and found only minor infractions of the fire code. The morning of the fire they had

returned to make sure the faults had been corrected. They left about 10:00 A.M.

The University provided the 32 men quarters on one floor of Brisco quad for the balance of the semester. The house will be restored, hopefully by September 1, from the proceeds of the insurance settlement.

The University made emergency

loan funds available to all of the burnt out residents, and also arranged for several merchants to extend credit for clothing replacement.

A number of Chi Phi chapters responded to the emergency with checks to the chapter. Council Member, John Craft, Iota Delta '61 collected the emergency fund and is disbursing it as the need arises.

Computer Locates Luggage Lost By Airline Industry

Brother Frank Bender, L '43 a Reno businessman whose luggage has gone astray now and then, has devised what he believes is the solution to the problem of baggage that goes off on trips of its own.

He has set up International Luggage Registry, P.O. Box 4300, Reno, Nevada, ZIP 89505, a computer-based clearing-house that can, he says, match lost luggage and its owner in minutes, regardless of the distance between them.

This is how it works. A prospective member registers with I.L.R. and they send him back identification labels for all his luggage, including sales cases, portable typewriters and cameras. When a bag goes astray the finder looks at the coded label and finds there directions for making a toll-free telephone call to the computer operator. Information on where the bag was found and where it will be retained for safe keeping is then punched into the drums.

Conversely, when the bag's owner discovers his loss, or learns that his luggage did not travel on the airplane with him, he too can make the same toll-free phone call.

If the electronic scan of the memory banks shows no trace of the bag as yet, the owner leaves the information that he is looking for his gear. Or if it already has been reported the information is turned over to him.

The labels, printed by the registry's computer, show the owner's registration number, and the toll-free telephone of I.L.R. in Reno. The customer gets a wallet-sized card with his registration number. The service costs \$5 a year.

The customer's name and address are not on the label. "People's homes have been robbed because someone at an airport saw their names on luggage", Brother Bender claims.

Another advantage is that the labels are pasted on, whereas under the present system many tags are torn off baggage in the handling or otherwise lost.

The new system has been endorsed by United, Trans World, Eastern, American Irish International and half a dozen feeder airlines. Greyhound Bus Lines is recommending it, and all the travel insurance counters of Mutual of Omaha Insurance Company now dispense I.L.R. application forms.

Oglethorpe Wins S.E. Cage Title

Basketball teams from 12 Southeastern Chi Phi chapters gathered in Atlanta on March 6-7, 1971 for the 6th Annual Southeastern Tournament. Brother Tom C. Smith, H'59 was chairman of the tournament sponsored by the Chi Phi Atlanta Alumni Association. Brother Dan D. Plaster, H'49, last year's tournament chairman, also played a vital role in the success of the tournament. After holding the tournament at Lovett School for the past four years it was decided to meet at the Oglethorpe College Field House in Atlanta. Those chapters represented were: Tau — University of Alabama, Mu Delta — Auburn University, Eta — University of Georgia, Gamma — Emory University, Chi Delta — Georgia State, Omega — Georgia Tech, Rho Delta — Oglethorpe College, Theta Delta — University of Florida, Nu Delta — Florida State University, Alpha-Alpha — University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill, Psi Delta — University of North Carolina at Charlotte and Phi Delta-University of Tennessee.

In first round play on Saturday morning Georgia Tech was defeated by Alabama, Emory over Tennessee, Florida over Georgia, Florida State over Auburn, Charlotte was defeated by Oglethorpe, and Chapel Hill over Georgia State. In afternoon play on Saturday, Alabama defeated Emory, and Oglethorpe in a double overtime, defeated Chapel Hill.

This year, those teams that lost in the first round of play were placed in a consolation bracket for the Third Place Trophy. In one of the best games of the tournament, Georgia State and Tennessee battled to a 52-46 victory for Tennessee, the Third Place and the Charles Nunnally Trophy.

On Sunday afternoon, Oglethorpe continued on their way to the top by defeating Florida State 61-40. The Gators from Florida defeated Alabama 32-29 for the Second Place and the Bates Block Trophy.

In the championship game, the University of Florida was defeated 63-25 by Oglethorpe College. Steve Lavoie, scoring 21 points in the championship game, was awarded the Rankin Smith — Most Valuable Player Award. The John E. Oliver Award Trophy was presented to the team captain by Brother Gladfelter a midst a large delegation of Chi Phi's and friends.

During the tournament the Ogle-

thorpe chapter operated the Concession stand providing Cokes and Hot Dogs for the players and spectators. The Chi Phi Atlanta Alumni Association treated all players to a Saturday lunch. On Saturday evening the Gamma Chapter hosted a party for all the players and their friends. In retrospect, the entire weekend was a time of Chi Phi fellowship for all who attended.
