Alpha-Alpha, Alpha-Chi, in Hoop Finale

Although the final results make this year's Chi Phi Southeastern Basketball Tournament look a great deal like last year's, the 1976 Tournament was without question the most exciting and competitive in the twelve (12) year history of the event. In a rematch of last year's final game, the championship went to Alpha-Alpha Chapter of the University of North Carolina, who defeated a powerful team from Alpha-Chi Chapter at Ohio Wesleyan by a score of 66-63 in the finals. North Carolina, led by Paul Sawyer, the tournament's most valuable player and winner of the Rankin Smith MVP Trophy, erased a twelve point first quarter deficit to turn the game into an absolute thriller. The championship game was a fitting climax to a tournament which saw every team participate in at least one game which was decided by five points or less.

The tournament is annually sponsored by the Chi Phi Georgia Alumni Association and this year drew fourteen (14) schools from seven (7) different states. The tournament is one of the few events, if not the only event, of its kind in the country, and it provides a unique opportunity for Chi Phis from throughout the eastern part of the country to gather for a weekend of competition and socializing. Both players and fans look forward to this event and several schools brought large contingents of spectators with them. Psi Delta Chapter from the University of North Carolina at Charlotte rallied over forty fans in-cluding Darryl McCall, our fraternity's Grand Alpha. Equally large crowds fol-lowed Theta Delta Chapter from the University of Florida. Host chapters Oglethorpe, Emory and the University of Georgia also brought a large number of spectators. Nearly 400 hundred people watched the Saturday games at the Oglethorpe University Fieldhouse.


The tournament was started in

almost-unbelievable fashion, with a game beginning at 8:00 a.m. on Saturday morning between Theta Delta and host, Rho Delta. This game went into triple overtime before Florida prevailed, 63 to 62. Karl Burgess and Peter Crockin of Oglethorpe set a blistering pace, scoring 28 and 20 points respectively, but they were matched by a balanced Florida attack led by Mathew Fitzgerald and Jim Ulseth. At the end of the second overtime, Burgess sank two free throws with no time remaining on the clock to send the game into the third overtime. With no time remaining on the clock in the third overtime and the score tied, Fitzgerald sank an equally pressure packed shot to give the win to Florida. It was general concensus that this was the most exciting game ever played in the Chi Phi Tournament and it was clearly a portent of a number of fine games to come. Other first round games saw Virginia down Georgia Tech by a score of 29 to 18; Hampden-Sydney defeat Auburn by a score of 41 to 20; Florida State edged Tennessee 35-34; eventual champion North Carolina trounced West Georgia 74 to 30; and Georgia edged Emory 25-24 in another thrilling

Virginia fielding its second fine team in a row was led by Hank Presse, who scored 14 points. Mike Skelton led Georgia Tech with 6 points. Hampden-(Continued on page 3)

Updike, Newest Trustee, Credits Theta Delta

Arch Updike, ThD 43, Lake Wales, Fla., and the newest Trustee of the Chi Phi Educational Trust, gives Theta Delta credit for his college degree.

When Arch pledged in the Fall of 1939, his finances were OK. When initiation time came along in February 1940, he couldn't find the money—and later a dry cleaning route where his best customers were the Chi Phis was all that kept him in school. He was finally initiated as a junior.

That was when his father was putting together a deal without cash to gain control of Alcoma Corporation, owners of Mammoth Grove near Lake Wales, reported to be the largest citrus grove in the World at that time.

Upon graduation in the middle of World War II, he went immediately to the Navy, with action in the amphibious crossing of the Rhine River serving with the U.S. Army. He came back to join his brother, John, ThD 45, and his brotherin-law, Horace Herndon, in working under his father, Arch Updike, Sr., to develop and expand both Alcoma Corp. and the family's individual citrus holdings.

Arch became president of Alcoma following his father's death, and sons of all three families have now entered the business, thus assuring continued family ownership for another generation.

Alcoma owns grove property near Fort Lauderdale, now becoming a development site, substantial grove properties at frost-protected Indiantown on the east side of Lake Okeechobee,

Michigan Library to be In Memory of Swanson

The Trustees of the Chi Phi Educational Trust will establish a memorial library room at the University of Michigan Chapter in memory of Herman O. Swanson, Alpha-Tau, '14 during the summer of 1976. A dedication service at the chapter house will take place during the fall. As announced in the February 1976 Chakett the Trust will receive approximately \$500,000 from the estate of Brother Swanson who passed away in May 1972.

Swanson came to Ann Arbor from Jamestown, New York in 1910 to study Automotive engineering. While a student at Michigan he joined a local fraternity, The Monks, which after many years of petitioning Chi Phi was finally accepted as a chapter in 1922. Thus Swanson became a Chi Phi many years after his graduation. For many years now many of the Monk members have been gathering in Ann Arbor each fall in reunion. Brother Swanson was one of those that enjoyed the return and fellowship of reunion.

During one such visit he came to know and respect Dr. Charles Smith A-T who was then the chapter advisor. It was Smith that first suggested the possibility of a gift to Swanson. Later Carl Gladfelter A-T '33 discussed and corresponded with Swanson on the subject, pointing out the merits of a gift to the Trust. Although Swanson appeared receptive to the idea,

no one suspected the depth or feeling that he had for the fraternity and the values it stands for.

Judge John A. Jamison of Fredericksburg, Virginia, a long time neighbor and Swanson's legal counselor, tells the following about one of the great influences in Swanson's decision to leave a major portion of his estate to the Trust.





Sawyer led the way in rebounding and Coach Byers' team played a very aggressive man-to-man defense. West Georgia was led by Tony

The Emory-Georgia contest featured two extremely aggressive teams. The lead changed hands with virtually every basket throughout the game and Georgia prevailed on the strength of two clutch baskets by Bruce Miller. Emory was led by the game's leading scorer,

In the first of the semi-final games, Ohio Wesleyan jumped to a 20-8 first quarter lead over North Carolina Charlotte. The Carolina team never could regain momentum as Ohio Wesleyan went on to win 66-40. Fox played a deadly outside shot and lagged 25 points for the game for Ohio Wesleyan. He was followed by Nash with 18 points and Jeffrey with 16 points. Rich Hough again played well and scored 14 points for UNCC.

Georgia played its second close game in a row in the winner's quarter-finals, but they were ousted by a scrappy Hampden-Sydney team, 30-29. Williams again played well for the Epsilon chapter, as he scored 16 points and seemed to have a hand in virtually every other Hampden-Sydney basket. Bruce Miller scored 12 points for Georgia.

Teams who lost their first round games continued in the consolation bracket, vying for the tournament's third place trophy. Opening consolation games saw Georgia Tech defeat crosstown rival, Emory by a score of 53 to 46. Skelton could not miss for Georgia Tech and scored 25 points. Hixon bagged 22 points for Emory, who stayed with the winners until the closing minutes. In another wild contest, Florida came from behind to beat Virginia 51-47. Florida again showed a balanced attack and they were led by Jim Ulseth with 15 points. Prasse led Virginia with 18 points. Crockin and Burgess again teamed to lead Oglethorpe to a 58-42 win over Tennessee. Franklin Cantrell scored 16 points, but his team could not stay with the hot Oglethorpe five in the second half. In another thrilling consolation round game, Auburn downed West

Georgia 39-37. Wes Stroud scored 20 points for the winners while Tony Allen hit 11 points for West Georgia.

In the consolation semi-finals, Florida, despite playing its fourth game of the day, put on a second half surge to slide by Georgia Tech, 51-46. Florida was down 28 to 16 at halftime, but the adrenaline began to flow in the third and fourth quarters. Florida was paced by the scoring and rebounding of Gary Sconne. Sconne netted 12 points, though Georgia Tech's Skelton led all scores with 18. The other consolation semi-final saw Oglethorpe streak past Auburn 48 to 25. Again, it was Crockin and Burgess who led the winners as they scored 15 points apiece. Auburn's Wes Stroud scored 17 points for Auburn.

Sunday's final games were preceded by a contest between tournament allstars and an alumni team. North Carolina Charlotte's Mike Hough proved to be too much for the old men as he scored 22 points. His coupled with Georgia Tech's Skelton's 12 points downed the alumni 51 to . (Since this article is being prepared by your alumni correspondent, the complete score will not be reported.) Craig McCroba, Gamma '73, paced the alumni with 19 points. George Duncan, Gamma '70, added 9 points.

The Sunday games were both fiercely contested rematches. Oglethorpe and Florida played in a rematch of the opening triple overtime game and once again provided over a hundred fans with a tremendous contest. Oglethorpe, led by 1 point at the quarter, all their points having been scored by Crockin and Burgess. They pulled ahead to a 4 point lead at the half. Florida capitalized on

Oglethorpe mistakes to tie it in the third quarter, paving the way for another tremendous finish. The lead changed hands throughout the final period, but led by Fitzgerald's fourth quarter points, the visiting Gators held on to win by 40 to 39.

The long-awaited rematch between Ohio Wesleyan and North Carolina proved to be all that could have been hoped for in a championship game. Both teams showed outstanding poise and execution and proved themselves to be among the best teams ever to have played in the Chi Phi Tournament. Sawyer's inside scoring and Lake's outside shooting led a determined Carolina effort. Both players tallied 18 points. Fox led a determined Ohio Wesleyan rally with 12 fourth quarter points and 20 for the game. He was followed on his team by Gunn with 16 points and Jeffrey with 15 points. Winning North Carolina was awarded the John Oliver Championship Trophy. Brother Bates Block, Grand Eta, presented the Bates Block Second Place Trophy; and the Charles Nunnally Third Place Trophy went to Theta Delta Chapter from the University of Florida.

The tremendous success of the Chi Phi Southeastern Tournament sponsored by the Georgia Alumni Association, has prompted efforts to establish similar tournaments in all geographic regions. Brother McCall even expressed the ambition of one day declaring a Chi Phi National Champion. What started twelve years ago as a wild idea of Carl Gladfelter, then National Director and Atlanta alumni, has developed into an event which yearly is a rewarding experience for actives and alumni alike.

Helliwell—The Man Behind Disney

Paul L. E. Helliwell, Theta Delta '36 is an impressive man, large physically, and gregarious—not one you might expect to handle a major hush-hush land deal for Walt Disney Productions of California, the developers and operators of Disneyland and Disney World.

Disney World in Central Florida is world famous, but not so well known is the story of how the land on which the complex stands was acquired before speculators could drive the prices up beyond reason. The Miami attorney who until recently was Trustee of the Chi Phi Educational Trust was the key figure in the maneuver.

Helliwell enlisted aid from several Theta Delta contemporaries living in the vicinity in researching his approach to land owners

The search for the huge Disney World site started in Spring 1964. Disney agents finally selected Orange and Osceola Counties—Orlando and Kissimmee—for the warm weather, the large tracts of undeveloped available land, and easy accessibility from the large Eastern and Midwestern urban areas, made possible by I-4 and Florida's Turnpike which traverse both counties. The land acquisition had to be secretive for obvious reasons and Miami Attorney Helliwell got it done. The eventual land purchase totaled 27,400 acres: twice the size of Manhattan Island.

The 1975 book: Florida's Disney World: Promises and Problems, by Leonard E. Zehnder provides the highlights of the dramatic land purchases and other maneuvering that took place prior to the actual announcement that Disney was coming to Florida.

According to the author, the May 4, 1965 edition of the *Orlando Sentinel* date-lined a brief story out of Kissimmee reporting two real estate transactions in Osceola County. The story read, "The larger sale involving 8,300 acres of land was made by Bronsons, Inc., of Kissimmee to Latin-American Development and Management Corp., 600 Brickell Ave., Miami, Florida . . . Recording the Bronson sale was Paul L. E. Helliwell." Helliwell's law firm was then located at 600 Brickell.

The May 28 Orlando Evening Star reported as follows: "Mystery Buying Tops \$5 Million."

"Cash land purchases by the unidentified company which plans to construct a plant employing 5,000 persons near Orlando have exceeded the staggering sum of \$5 million. To be exact: \$5,018,770. This became clear today when Florida Ranch Lands, Inc., Orlando broker, supplied the Evening Star with a detailed breakdown of 47 transactions made by it for the unidentified buyer.

"Acreage involved is 27,258 acres, give or take a little, and was acquired at an average price of less than \$200 an acre, according to Nelson Boice, President.

"The land was acquired by Miami interests through three corporations, Bay Lake Properties, Ayefour Corp. and Latin American Development and Management Corp. . . . What the new industry will be, no one knows except the buyers and they aren't telling."

On June 25th the Evening Star reported the following:

"Orlando's mystery industry whatever it is—is now in the "second

phase" of development.

"Paul Helliwell, Miami attorney for the unidentified interests who have purchased almost 30,000 acres in southwest Orange and northern Osceola Counties, made that emphatically clear here today to *The Evening Star*.

"Helliwell said that options on the last two sizable pieces of the \$5 million real estate transactions would be closed today and Friday. That ends Phase One, he said. We are now proceeding into Phase Two which involves planning, engineering and the myriad other things that must be done looking toward the final determination of the use of the property.

"Phase Two, he said, involves a helluva lot of work. As to the next step after Phase Two, Helliwell said: You can call that, Let's Go! Helliwell again said that he was not at liberty to discuss the name of his clients or the proposed industry which he had previously said would employ 5,000 people and bring an additional 20,000 people into Metropolitan Orlando."

Helliwell not only retained the land brokers and the site engineers who handled the water control and drainage

studies, but directed all the give and take of the political considerations, after the Disney connection was revealed.

Zehnder's account in his book quotes Helliwell as follows on governmental officials cooperation as reported in a November 4 Sentinel column: "Paul Helliwell, Miami attorney who represents the Disney interests, did make this statement before he disappeared behind a closed door: We're still pleased with the cooperation we're getting from government officials."

He also passed out a typed statement as he was talking. It read: Based upon past experience, it is essential there be a highway system adequate to handle the flow of traffic which is generated by a Disney type operation. This refers not only to roads leading directly to the project area but, since statistics indicate 80 per cent of all tourists presently enter Florida by automobile, an adequate state-wide network as well.

"One of the reasons the proposed location was selected was that a careful analysis of existing highways, highways under construction and, importantly, highway planning in Florida, indicated a sound base from which an adequate system could and would be developed within a reasonable time.

"In all discussions during the past 18 months, it has been made quite clear that satisfactory assurance that such a system would be developed is an essential element in any decision to go forward. This position remains unchanged."

Brother Helliwell, 61, was born in Brooklyn, but brought up in rural Hillsborough County, graduating from Plant City High School. He was initiated into Theta Delta in the Fall of 1935, just a few months after the chapter was installed at the University of Florida. He received his undergraduate degree in 1936, and graduated from the College of Law in 1939, meanwhile serving as Theta Delta's Alpha for one term.

He barely set up his practice when he was called into service, with duty in military intelligence, culminating as Chief of the Middle East Theater. Following the War, he set up practice in Miami, and is senior patter in Helliwell,

and a new citrus development near Clewiston on the south shore of the big lake.

A concentrate plant and fresh fruit packing enterprise are located east of Lake Wales on Highway 60, one of Florida's prime east-west arteries.

For seven years he has been president of Applied Agricultural Research Foundation, formerly Soil Science Foundation, a privately-supported research effort headquartered in Lakeland, Fla. Chi Phi Benefactor Sought Oriental Rugs

Swanson said, according to Jamison, following a reunion visit, "They (alumni and chapter members) took me to their hearts and made me feel at home. If I had not known I was in Michigan, I would have thought I was back in Virginia, those boys were so warm and friendly." His conservative bent made itself evident in his final comment on his trip to Ann Arbor when he said, "their hair seemed shorter to me too."

In following account, Judge Jamison gives us a brief look at the man who has made it possible for many future generations of Chi Phis to receive the benefits of his foresight and generosity.

Herman O. Swanson was born in Jamestown, New York, on May 15, 1887. He graduated from University of Michigan at Ann Arbor in the class of 1914, having been awarded one of the first of the University's degrees in automotive engineering.

Shortly thereafter he was employed by the Franklin Car Company, which manufactured the then unique aircooled engine for a popular but expensive luxury car, whose manufacture was discontinued during the 1920's.

Mr. Swanson was married to Olive Alsop in 1919 during his residence in Carlisle Illinois, while employed by the Franklin Company. Mrs. Swanson was a Virginia girl to whose ancestral home in Spotsylvania County, Virginia, the cou-ple returned in 1919 where they continued to reside until their deaths. Mr. Swanson's father acquired wealth as a successful furniture retailer in Jamestown, New York, and frequently importuned his son to return to his hometown to go into business with him; but he enjoyed the leisurely life afforded by being a gentleman farmer in Virginia where he loved the pursuit of culture, and travel with his wife who accompanied him on numerous world tours.

Mr. Swanson was an avid collector of oriental rugs, and purchased many of them on his travels to the East and Near East. His rug collection was considered one of the most complete and expensive in the United States, one of his rugs having been appraised at more than \$20,00-0.00 He enjoyed entertaining his friends and civic groups with his motion picture record of his travels in foreign lands. He


was one of the early amateur motion picture enthusiasts and he was frequently sought after as an exhibitor of photographic records of his travels to exotic places. He was in his 84th year when he took his last trip to Russia while still searching for rare rug specimens in little traveled corners of the world. He had a special desire to see the Pazyryh carpet in Leningrad and on his return home he gave a most interesting lecture on this ancient work of art. On the same trip, he visited Iran to observe the modern manufacture of persian rugs at Tabriz

He was an avid conservationist and ecologist, practicing these protective arts on his family lands, refusing to sell any of the property which might be put to commercial development.

He was an expert rifle shot and fredemonstrated marksmanship. Once he heard shots coming from a secluded part of his property, and, taking his rifle, walked down to the section from which the reports came. He detected several villainous looking characters taking pot shots with their rifles at tin cans and bottles, but not very expertly. One of them asked Mr. Swanson, with some skepticism, whether he would like to try his hand at breaking the bottle at 40 yards. Fortunately, his luck held as he broke the bottle on the first shot, an accomplishment the unwelcomed visitors had not been able to match after using several boxes of ammunition. Their observation of Mr. Swanson's prowess caused them to beat a hasty retreat.

Mr. Swanson felt a closeness to the land. He was renewed by the changing seasons. Nature's cycle governed his life, from the green promise of spring to the mature ripeness of autumn.

The Swansons were able to furnish

their home, "La Vue", by inheritance from her family of rare and interesting 18th century antiques. "La Vue" sits high on a hill in Spotsylvania County, affording a magnificent panoramic view of the Rappahannock Valley. There was little wonder that this adopted Yankee refused to return to his boyhood home when life offered so much to him among the rolling hills of Virginia. There were about 1400 acres in the "La Vue" plantation tract and his days were not idle as he seriously pursued his farming interests. Herman Swanson was a man of education and culture and his knowledge of current events and foreign affairs was phenomenal.

He died in May, 1972, at age 85. He had the bearing and the manner of a man of 60. Always youthful in outlook, he enjoyed excellent health with an abundance of vigor and physical stamina. His memory will live on. Helliwell
