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



HIS LIFE WAS LONG, BUT OUR FRIENDSHIP WAS TOO SHORT

Watts Gunn, Omega 1928 died again today. Was alive. Was telling ancient golf stories. Barking drink orders. Then one day he fell down, went to the hospital, came back home, didn't get better and went back to the hospital and died. Just up and dies on me. Died on us. Do you remember? Fifteen years ago? Every day he does this to me. Up and dies. Watts Gunn aint around anymore, and I'm still mad about it.

Remember the first time you saw someone who became an intimate part of your life? Your wife? Husband? Golf pro? Sometimes it's a fuzzy memory, but I have to admit I was ready for Watts Gunn. I remember the first time I saw him. Vividly.

In 1990, I was serving on a charity golf tournament committee benefiting Atlanta's Senior Citizens Services. The committee voted to offer honorary chairmanships to great Georgia golfers, preferably older ones. For this tournament, they picked Watts Gunn. The real chairman called to ask me if I'd be willing to pick up Watts at his home and bring him to the party the night before the tournament.

Watts Gunn, I thought? He's still around? Well, yes he was, I was told, and here's his address and phone number. Call him and pick him up. His wife, Jane, is coming, too. And guess what, during lunch before the tournament, you're going to make a speech about him, so hit the books Mr. Golf Historian.

Watts Gunn, the great Georgia amateur. Bob Jones' college pal. The guy who was runner-up to Jones in the 1925 United States Amateur at Oakmont. 1925? Born in a fairly modern year, I couldn't conceive such a time. Still can't. And as I drove down West Conway in the heart of old Buckhead, then turned onto his winding, pea-gravel driveway, I wondered what he'd look like now, compared to the old black and whites of him when he was winning amateur golf tournaments as a Georgia Tech golfer. I wondered if we'd hit it off. A wide-eyed fan and the old grizzled veteran. He was 56 years old when I was born.

I was nervous, I admit. Watts Gunn was a celebrity in my book. He was already standing at the end of the walkway that came out of the sunroom where we would spend the next three and a half years together, catching up. There in his grey slacks, button-down shirt, rep tie and camel hair jacket and a green felt hat. He looked like a senior Brooks Brothers model. I got out of the car and introduced myself to the man who to this day holds the record for holes won in a row in a 36 hole international competition: 15, set at the 1925 Amateur. After that tempest, the Yankee press immediately dubbed him, "The Southern Hurricane."

I introduced myself to the man who's best known, though, for that week in 1925 with his pal, when the two of them put another tidbit in the record book: never before in a U.S. Amateur have the champion and runner-up been from the same town, the same college, the same club, who rode up there and back on the same train. I introduced myself, then said, "Nice chapeau."

Watts Gunn looked at me a little sideways. I knew he was wondering, who's *this* cat. This cat was your new best friend, like it or not. And we liked it, and I loved him.

I got to know all of his nicknames, all ancient ... "Wattsie" ... "Jeeps," because he always reacted to something with "Jeepuhs Creepuhs." That old-world Southern accent of his was right out of central casting, but it was real, and crusty. He got called, "Old Boy" ... "Old Man." He had a portfolio of toasts, one of which he laid on a gal at the pre-tournament party. Before Watts took a sip of his all-time favorite cocktail, "The Gunn Shot"—vodka, water, and a couple of enthusiastic dashes of Angostura bitters—he said, "Keep your head down and your tail up!"

With raised eyebrows, she asked, "Mr. Gunn, are you talking about golf or sex?"

"Why - golf, of course!"





At that moment I had no idea if Watts was telling the truth. Years later I came to know the truth: the old boy meant both.

Don't ever think you can save someone from themselves when they're real comfortable with who they are and what they like to do. It ain't going to happen. I knew Watts was waiting to die. There was no doubt in my mind. He never wanted to do anything. You had to cajole him into getting dressed up and going somewhere. Sometimes we had to force him to walk around the house. One time I asked him if he wanted to do some stretches. I thought he might slug me. So you had to make a huge, planned effort.

One bright February afternoon in 1992 I had a grand idea: I packed him into the car and took him to his old East Lake Golf Club. That day the club was having a "reverse" tournament where you teed off near a green and putted into a hole in a tee box. Watts, the purist, thought the idea of a reverse tournament was the silliest thing he'd ever heard. He was excited about seeing the old place, though, but driving anywhere in town was a harrowing experience for him.

I'd push his feet and legs into the foot well, then pull the seat belt around him. He was always amazed at the traffic, even in normal conditions. It was as if he'd never seen a jogger or a guy standing close by the curb at a street corner. On the downtown connector, even in light traffic, he'd clutch some part of the console with his left hand and the door handle with his right. He flinched the whole way there and constantly barked for me to slow down. I turned left onto Second Avenue. I looked over at him once you could see the golf course to the right. No reaction. He's just gazing at it. I asked him how long it had been since he'd been here. He couldn't remember. I glanced over at him after I turned onto Alston. Nothing. It seemed like he was soaking it in. In his own way. He had to be. I didn't press.

I put him into a golf cart and drove him around the course and up close to East Lakers hitting approach shots, putting out, standing on tee boxes. Some of them openly gawked. They thought Watts Gunn was dead. They asked if he'd stay and join them in the bar. He did. Tommy Barnes walked in. Watts began to cry. He wiped his tears with his shaking, feeble hand. Watts let himself get over-served, and then we got back into the car.

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

The emotion was still thick. I knew he was thrilled at what just happened. I would have given a lot to know what was going through his mind at that moment. I turned right out of the front gate and told him I was taking him up the street to show him the house he lived in when his family moved from Macon sometime in 1923 to East Lake when he was a student at Georgia Tech. It's across Alston from the 11th green.

"Naw," he growled. "Let's go home."


Sorry, we were already there, sitting at the end of the driveway. At the other end, by the house, was an old Volkswagen van. The grass in the front needed to be cut and the bushes around the house needed to be clipped. But the house was still beautiful. It was still grand. There were huge, crooked magnolia trees in the front yard. "Let's knock on the door and see what happens," I said.

"Naw."

"I'll tell them who you are, and maybe they'll let us see your old room." I was getting excited. Two sentimental adventures in one day.

He growled again ... "Nαw."

I knew he meant it. He really wasn't interested. On the way back through town I had another idea. I announced that we were going to visit The Georgia Institute of Technology. That we'd take a spin through campus and why not try to find his old fraternity house. Watts finally smiled. He said, "Chee Fee."



I grew up outside of Atlanta and went to Tech football games as a kid, but I had no idea where frat row was. Thank God I found it. We were both about to have a life experience.

I stopped the car in front of a set of steep, brick steps. It was hard enough to get Watts up three steps, and now that he'd had a few I wondered if he'd make it. But we started up, as slowly as you can imagine, with his left hand in my left and my right arm wrapped around his back.

Just after we saw the Chi Phi house looming above us we also saw faces appear in the front, one by one, in the lower windows. The guys were smiling. I honestly felt at that moment that they knew what was happening.

It was so natural, so sweet, their expressions for this unexpected moment. Here's some guy hauling up the steps an ancient brother. Here for a final visit. Then they walked out of the front door, five or six of them. I said, "Fellows, this is Watts Gunn, class of 1928."

One of them said, "Welcome back, Mr. Gunn," then they swept us inside. In the living room Watts watched as others came through side doors and from down the staircase. At least 20 young men gathered in a semicircle in front of Watts, then a fellow who I assumed was the president came forward. It was as if they had rehearsed this moment. I was struck by their instant formality, but they were smiling. The fellow introduced himself, then I introduced Watts again. "Gentlemen, this is Watts Gunn. Chi Phi. Class of 1928. Commence. Watts was Bob Jones' protégé."



The fellow in front of Watts said, "We know." And Watts Gunn cried again. His tears welled to the size of golf balls, then rolled down his cheeks.


Birth of your children? First time you broke 80? That time you avoided a car accident that would have killed you? Top-10 life moments? Make that February afternoon at the chee fee house a top-3.

Watts fell at his house on West Conway, where he and Jane lived since 1950. You could see only part of it from the street. It was tucked back in there under enormous pine trees. Watts' face hit the hardwood floor by the front door. Nothing cushioned his fall. That horrible moment began the quick decline. The nurse, Elizabeth, who spent the day, seven days a week, with Jane and Watts, went into action. She was surprised it hadn't happened sooner. She called the fire station just half a mile up West Conway. The firemen and the paramedic had been to 610 many times before. They took Watts to Piedmont Hospital. A day later he came back.

I don't know why, but he came back, and was propped up in the bed where I had tucked him in a few times over those years. He was back, but he was not good. He drifted in and out. He wasn't comfortable. He couldn't speak. His lips and nose were swollen. Elizabeth had had enough and got him back in the hospital again, and I went to see him. Better, but the end was near. I phoned the house from the hospital room and had him speak to Jane. "Dear," he said, "I love you so much I can't tell you."

When he died five days later, at 89, he was the oldest living U.S. Walker Cup team member. In his day, he was one of the world's finest amateurs. His golf records and his friendship with Bob Jones always intrigued me and his friends—it surrounded him, really—but Watts was humble until the end. During our friendship, he never uttered a word about his accomplishments unless he was asked—and I asked him a lot. He always chose to talk about his old golf pals, over and over: Jones, Francis Ouimet, Jess Sweetser, Roland Mackenzie, and his friend and chronicler of all great Georgia amateurs, O. B. Keeler.

Watts is buried in Macon at the old Riverside cemetery. For all he did, his small granite marker is plain, plain: name, birth, death. Watts is there by his mother and father and six other Gunns. Jane passed away seven years later. Jane Forrester Gunn, the Sewickley, Pennsylvania beauty. There too. In her own way she was just as much fun as Watts. At the time of his death, they had been married for 57 years. They had no children. But every once in a while they'd both get that look in their eye and admit they tried like hell. Those two. Incredible fun. And from time to time I remember an odd bit about Watts: he had no middle name.

After a recent hurricane passed through the Southeast, I went to visit Watts and Jane. It was a sunny, fall-like day in summer. Vivid blue sky and puffy white clouds. After a moment gazing at their markers, I wondered what makes you turn away for a moment. I guess to gather yourself. Too many memories at one time. Odd thoughts. Guilt at not having done as much as you could. I turned away and gazed at an ancient magnolia tree a few yards away. A flock of starlings dove into the canopy from the left, and the clouds above were whipping along from the right. At that moment I knew there were no answers to any of this. Just keep remembering Watts and Jane. That's easy. So easy it's natural now. But it still hurts every time

In my work, I entertain people on the golf course. Men bond out there and no matter what they shoot, they carry good feelings into the men's grill. Before we clink our glasses together, I always offer up a toast, a toast handed down to Watts Gunn by O.B. Keeler. The toast was Watts' favorite. "Here's to Hell." I say.

Clink...clink...clink.

"May the stay there be as pleasant as the way there." I always have to repeat it. Always laughter after the second act. Unasked, I tell my guests that the toast was the favorite of the great old Georgia amateur, Watts Gunn. It never fails: one of them will swallow, squint, then ask, "Who's that?"

Psi Delta and Delta Zeta are Crowned

CHAMPIONS!

They weren't competing for baskets. They were competing for impact, participation and bragging rights. In the end, the Chi Phi Final Four was comprised of Psi Delta, Delta Zeta, Delta Xi and Kappa Delta.

Between March 1 and April 4, student and alumni volunteers aggressively raised money for their particular Chapter Excellence Fund and for the general scholarship fund at the Chi Phi Educational Trust.

The plan was simple: Can we raise at least \$1,000 from every Chi Phi Chapter? And, can we convince at least 10 men from each Chapter (student or alumni) to participate.

Chapters readily embraced the concept and jumped right in. Psi Delta Chapter raised the most money from their alumni totaling \$10,000. Delta Zeta Chapter at the University of South Florida led their bracket to raise the most money from students - \$370.

The money raised was important. However, participation was just as important. Again, Delta Zeta Chapter, led the way, convincing 3% of their alumni to participate which helped them bring home the Alumni Participation Championship and 68% of his undergraduate Chapter earning them the Student Participation Championship.

"Who would have thought we could raise \$30,000 in such a short period of time," asked Trust Chairman Christopher Shuler, Alpha Zeta 1984. "This demonstrates how passionate our Chi Phi leaders are across the country. Through their efforts, we'll award at least \$50,000 to students in academic scholarships, and many Chapters made sizeable deposits to the balance of their Chapter Excellence Funds."

Chapter Accreditation: Six Months Later

During the 145th Chi Phi Congress in Boston, MA, the congressional delegates approved the trial year implementation of the Chapter Accreditation Program. The program is designed to strengthen Chapter health by:


- Providing a clear set of operational and programming expectations for Chapters.
- Creating a mechanism to hold Chapters not meeting a certain level of operational and programming success accountable for doing so.
- Having a subjective mechanism which allows the Fraternity to recognize and reward Chapters for their consistency in meeting and exceeding operational and programming expectations.
- Producing a data driven mechanism that identifies areas in which Chapters need additional resources and support both on a local level, with individual Chapters and from a Fraternity-wide perspective.

During the Fall 2010 semester, the National Staff educated student leaders and university professionals about the new program and the implementation timeline. The submission process started on January 4, 2011, and 43 of 52 eligible Chapters submitted their Accreditation material. Each submission was graded and reviewed by the Chapter Accreditation Committee, and both Chapter and national trends were analyzed. Below are two tables that outline the areas of strength and areas that should be prioritized for improvement. As one can see, the areas of strength for the National Fraternity are Proactive Risk Management, Campus and Community Engagement, Leadership Advancement and Organizational Networking. Areas the National Fraternity will prioritize for improvement are Academic Health, Continuity-Recruitment and Retention, Asset Stewardship-Financial and Property Management, and Total Member Education.

Creating additional resources and guidance in each of these areas will be a priority for the National Fraternity in the coming year. Moving forward, each Chapter will receive information about their areas of strength, areas to prioritize for improvement and how they compare nationally in each area. Chapters should receive this information during March 2011. Chapters/Colonies will be asked to resubmit an accreditation report for the Spring 2011 semester by May 1, 2011.

"This semester's data provides a good reference point regarding the health of our Chapters," said Director of Undergraduate Services Deanne Walters. "The information gained by the accreditation process provides clear direction to our Chapters regarding operational and programmatic standards and clear direction to the Fraternity regarding resource and programming priority areas. While we anticipate Chapters will continually improve their efficacy of operational and programmatic standards, it will not happen without dedicated and targeted efforts by the Fraternity to provide education, structure and resources."



The defending champions proudly marched into opposing territory to defend their Chi Phi Bowl title. For the second year in a row, the Mu Theta Chapter (University of the Incarnate Word) faced off on the gridiron against Lambda Zeta (St. Mary's University).

The Alpha Delta Alumni Association is trying to save their beloved Chapter house that was originally built in 1932.

Three years ago, all active members were asked to leave the house by the end of that semester because a local ordinance required all fraternities in State College have a complete sprinkler system installed before September 2008. In addition to a sprinkler system, the house was in great need of major repairs and a complete renovation. The Alumni Association agreed that it was time to "do it right, or not do it at all." After much planning, they developed the "Fifty-year Plan" and identified \$1.7 million worth of renovations. They also set out to raise an additional \$500,000 maintenance fund to help properly maintain the property and protect it for years to come.

To date, the Alumni Association has raised just over \$1.25 million toward their \$2.25 million goal from 285 of the 965 alumni members – a 30% response rate so far. "Alumni understand the uphill battle we have before us, but as more alumni hear about what is occurring, more Brothers continue to step up and make pledge commitments," said long-time alumni advisor Andy Schultz, Alpha Delta 1960. "Until we meet our goal, the property will remain vacant."

80 Hours of RLA EDUCATIONAL PROGRAMMING

This year Chi Phi provided more than eighty hours of educational programming through seven Regional Leadership Alliances (RLA).

In a slight change from years past, the Fraternity hosted six of the seven RLAs at hotels off campus. This format worked well for the 356 students and alumni that attended the sessions in Atlanta, Georgia, Corvallis, Oregon, Austin, Texas, Indianapolis, Indiana, Tampa, Florida, Lancaster, Pennsylvania and Albany, New York.

"RLAs play such an important role in our educational model," explained Director of Undergraduate Services Deanne Walters, Zeta Tau Alpha Fraternity. "This year, we worked directly with 19% of all of our undergraduate members and almost all of our chapter officers. It's a wonderful opportunity to train these young men not only about how to run their chapter but how to lead in all aspects of their lives."

The two-day program typically runs all day on Saturday and until 2:00 p.m. on Sunday. There are three general tracks for participants: the Alpha Academy for Chapter and Colony presidents, an Alumni Education Track for alumni advisors and young alumni and an Undergraduate Track for all other students.

Topics within the Undergraduate Track included:

Authentically Chi Phi –A Discussion of Chi Phi Values

Developing Better Men -Total Membership Education

Chapter/Individual Finances

Communication Etiquette for the 21st Century,

Roundtable discussions with all participants.

Phired Up Productions helped facilitate recruitment training from 9:00 a.m. until 2:00 p.m. on Sunday. The Phired Up staff focused on the personal skills necessary to recruit quality men at the Texas, Indianapolis, Florida, Pennsylvania and New York RLAs.

Heritage and Traditions Counselor **Glenn Johnson, Mu Theta 2004**, and Total Membership Education Chairman **Jim Davis, Omega 1975**, conducted Ritual education
workshops at the Atlanta and Oregon RLAs.

Donors to the Chi Phi Educational Trust provide a majority of the funding needed to conduct the RLA program. To show their appreciation, students joined the Men of 1824 and raised more than \$1,500 to support future educational programming.

Ways to Support RLAs and Other Leadership Development Programs

Donors can support and change the lives of Chi Phi students and Chapters using a variety of outright, pledged and deferred giving methods. Some of the more popular giving methods are outlined below. Chi Phi volunteers and staff are available to hold a confidential consultation to discuss these options in more detail.

CASH: Gifts made by cash, credit card, money order and check provide donors with a charitable deduction and provide immediate support to Chi Phi.

STOCK: Giving long-term, appreciated stock allows donors to avoid paying capital gains on the increase in the stock's value. Donors also typically receive a tax deduction for the full fair market value of the stock on the date of the gift.

PLEDGES: Many donors may choose to make their gift over a period of time, up to five years. Donors can determine whether they want to make their gift on an annual, semi-annual, quarterly or monthly basis using cash, check, a credit card or stock.

CORPORATE MATCHING: Many companies will match or multiply a donation made to the Chi Phi Educational Trust through their matching gift program. As a result, donors can double or triple their gift to the cause they support by simply completing their company's matching gift form.

BEQUEST: Donors establish a bequest by adding basic language to their Last Will and Testament or trust documents naming the Chi Phi Educational Trust as a beneficiary of a specific amount or percentage of their estate.

RETIREMENT PLAN: Name the Educational Trust as the beneficiary of all or a portion of your IRA, pension, 401(k) or other retirement plan.


LIFE INSURANCE: If you own life insurance policy that you no longer need, you can name the Chi Phi Educational Trust as the owner and beneficiary of the policy. If the policy has a cash value, you can take a charitable deduction approximately equal to its cash value. If you still pay annual premiums, you can deduct the premium payment each year.

CHARITABLE REMAINDER TRUST: When you create a charitable remainder trust, you give money, securities or other assets to a trust you create that will then pay you an income for life (or for a period of years). If you wish, the trust also can pay income to other beneficiaries of your choice. At the death of the final beneficiary, the remaining balance goes to the Chi Phi Educational Trust.

705 Donors in 2010



In 2010, 705 alumni, students, parents and friends made 1,072 gifts totaling \$444,143.52 to Chi Phi to support students, Chapters, scholarships, leadership training and more – an 11% increase over 2009.

These generous contributors helped more than 400 students attend and learn at Regional Leadership Alliances, and they awarded scholarships worth \$88,464 to students to continue their higher education.

Of the 705 donors, 42 men joined the Gladfelter Circle, with a gift of \$2,000 or more - up nine from the previous year.

James W. "Jim" Wimberly Jr., Eta 1965, made the single largest contribution of \$125,825 to support the Eta Chapter Excellence Fund. (See the related story on pages 32 and 33).

As a result of Wimberly's generosity, Eta Chapter at the University of Georgia took the top spot for contributing the most money. Nearly 43%, \$189,067.48, was contributed by Eta alumni. Alpha Chapter at the University of Virginia held the second spot for dollars donated, but they had more individual donors (51) than any other Chi Phi Chapter.

Graduates from the 1960s contributed nearly half of the money raised in calendar year 2010 followed by alumni from the 1970s.

Donors reside in 44 states, Ontario and Nova Scotia. Nearly 17% - of all donors reside in the State of Georgia.





Behind Eta Chapter

The best fraternities have them - long-time, dedicated alumni advisors who are not afraid to go to bat for the Chapter against the university, and who are not afraid to show up at a recruitment event and help rush prospective new members.

For Chi Phi at the University of Georgia, that man is **James W. "Jim" Wimberly Jr., Eta 1965**.

"I first got started working for Chi Phi my sophomore year when I was asked to be Rush Chairman," explained Wimberly, "and I've been rushing boys into this Fraternity ever since. **Peter Amann, Eta 1968**, got me started again in the late 1970's, in an alumni role."

When he's not advising national trade associations or representing employers in a labor management dispute, Wimberly, an attorney, is often at a Chi Phi recruitment event or spending time with the actives at the chapter house in Athens, Georgia. He can quickly cite the statistics and the status of blue-chip recruits for both the University of Georgia Bulldog football program and Eta. On more than one occasion, he's been known to push back against the University administration when he felt they might be violating a contract or mistreating Eta.



"Jim is a force. I don't know how he does it all," commented **John McElderry, Eta 1994**. "There's no question that Jim Wimberly is a legend among our Chapter and one of the reasons we have remained successful over so many years."

Wimberly's passion for Chi Phi is contagious. It is fueling Eta Chapter's efforts to build a new chapter house. To support this project, he's made a \$500,000 pledge and already contributed nearly \$250,000 to start it.

Explaining why he's remained so active over the years, Wimberly commented, "My parents taught me to enjoy my college experience, and Chi Phi gave me the opportunity to learn certain leadership qualities that have benefited my career enormously. Working with the boys in the Chapter has always been a great pleasure to me, and I particularly get excited when we pledge legacies from someone I knew in the Chapter. In short, my role at Chi Phi has benefited me personally and professionally."


Born in Augusta, Georgia, Wimberly arrived at UGA in 1961.

GAMMA CHAPTER:

Recruiting, Recolonizing and Raising Money



Gone from Emory University since 2009, preparations are underway for Chi Phi to recharter Gamma Chapter in 2012.

Alumni have spent countless hours planning and preparing to ensure a successful return to campus and to the Gamma Chapter house, Connolly Hall. They've spent much time working with University administrators and staff from the National Office to forge a successful partnership that will result in a healthy new Chapter.

In addition to the recolonization planning, Gamma has launched an exciting campaign to build the Gamma Chapter Excellence Fund (CEF) at the Chi Phi Educational Trust. Working with Director of Development **Elizabeth Knott, Kappa Delta Sorority**, the Emory Chi Phis plan to raise at least \$50,000 to recruit the best men on campus and to provide the leadership and educational development necessary to guide the Chapter in perpetuity.

The \$50,000 fundraising effort, combined with nearly \$100,000 that is already in their existing CEF will provide nearly \$7,500 in scholarships and educational grants each year.

Recruitment is a key part of why the alumni felt this campaign was important. Awarding scholarships will help Gamma recruit quality young men, recognize chapter officers, encourage chapter and campus involvement and much more.

Alumnus **Preston Herren, Gamma 1964**, explained, "Scholarships are a selling point to potential members. The kind of men that we want to join will be excited about a scholarship. It is important for Gamma to fund the maximum number of scholarships that we can."

Gamma alumni imagine offering the entire 2012 new member class a scholarship, or being able to send all new chapter officers to the Chi Phi College of Excellence. There are dreams of offering each brother with a 3.5 or higher grade point average a \$1,000 scholarship to reward his hard work.

The second driving force behind the campaign is to provide leadership development opportunities for their members. Gamma alumni know how important strong leadership is to the long term success of the Chapter. By funding the CEF, alumni provide a resource for members to attend vital leadership development programs such as the Chi Phi Regional Leadership Alliance, College of Excellence, the Undergraduate Interfraternity Institute and more.

"Strong leaders will help guide the Chapter and ensure a successful return," said Herren. "They'll also stop problems from happening in the future."

Arming themselves with these recruiting and training tools will help return Gamma to its rightful place at Emory. Installed a mere 33 years after Emory was founded, Chi Phi has a long and distinguished history at the University. Enhancing the resources available to the Chapter will help continue that positive tradition. Scholarships and awards will give Gamma a recruiting edge and lay a foundation for future growth and sustainability.

Bucky Dykes, Gamma 1972, summarized the feelings of many donors to the Gamma CEF when he stated, "I decided to support the campaign for Gamma Chapter because of the long legacy of Chi Phi at Emory. There are buildings on campus bearing the names of Chi Phi men. Emory has had many Trustees and Presidents that were Chi Phi men. I couldn't let that legacy end."

Recruiting a quality class of new members and raising the funds to bolster the Gamma CEF are the keys to the successful return and ongoing viability of Chi Phi at Emory.



Why Responsibility & Accountability Matter:

The Perspective of a New Alumnus

Our Chapter spends a lot of time talking about how to build better men: developmental instruction we can offer, bonds we can strengthen, activities to plan, etc. But one thing we often overlook is the simple matter of how we think about responsibility and accountability.

These two topics are not just vital to the organizational function of our Chapter: they are the building blocks for a successful academic and professional career and a productive life.

Before Chi Phi, and even more so before college, I had an extremely poor work ethic. I caused numerous problems for myself. I barely managed to graduate high school on time. I was not held accountable, nor interested in taking responsibility for my actions, until Chi Phi.

Chi Phi taught me how to manage my time and take responsibility. When I became Beta, I had to figure out - and not without help - how to make lists of things that needed to be done, how to keep track of dates so things didn't sneak up on me, and how to hold myself and others accountable to our commitments. These skills are applicable not just to Chi Phi, but to any personal, academic or professional endeavor we will ever undertake.

Chi Phi was one of my first regular commitments that was fully voluntary. I wanted to be a part of the Fraternity, and I knew some shaping up was in order. I had to be at things on time, meet deadlines and do what I said I would do.

No more messing around.

I did a complete 180 because it's what I wanted for myself. This was a big step for me, and my brothers and the rules we had in place were a big part of that.

My perspective now is that of a fairly busy and disciplined alumnus. I spent four very active years in the Fraternity, was Student Body President and now work full-time and own two businesses on the side. **And I unequivocally attribute my success to the responsibility I developed in Chi Phi**.

My duties within the Chapter taught me how to follow through on my commitments. Our debates taught me how to be patient and compromise with people with whom I might disagree. And the strictness of our Chapter's Judicial Board taught me not to expect exceptions or special treatment.

My point here is that some of the biggest life lessons our Chapters can offer are not member development activities but the view we take on our responsibilities and obligations.

Some people are poor time managers and have trouble making good grades, completing study hours, getting to Chapter meetings on time or keeping up with committee work.

The easy thing for these people, and for the Chapter to do, is to accommodate.

- "Yes, we'll excuse your absence even though you didn't text or call."
- "Yes, you may attend the brotherhood retreat even though you missed study hours this week."
- "Yes, you can still run for the officer position you want even though you're on scholastic probation."
- "Yes, you can leave the Chapter meeting early because you are behind on your studying."

The *hard* thing to do - but what I believe is more beneficial in the long term - is to draw hard lines and not bend them except in extreme cases. **This reflects reality**. This is the world after college, and the world that I feel Chi Phi should be preparing its members for.

As students it is relatively easy to shirk responsibility and have things our way. We can skip class without consequence, get special treatment from professors by attending office hours, and get ourselves excused from pretty much any responsibility we have if we play our cards right. This may be convenient, but it does not work in real life.

In real life, there is an unprecedented number of students graduating without ever learning true accountability and responsibility, and it is sorely affecting their employment prospects. Managers get calls - whether on interview day or on work days - with reports like "I'm stuck in traffic," "I got pulled over," "I have to take care of some things at home," or "my car wouldn't start."

We might let these excuses work for us in the Chapter, and our professors might even let them slide in class, but we simply cannot depend upon them in the real world.

I'm not suggesting any direct policy changes. I ask only that every Chi Phi Brother consider carefully what is truly important from a development standpoint, and in what ways the Chapter can best deliver upon them and prepare our members for life in the real world.



Tax Law Changes Impact Charitable Giving

The Tax Relief, Unemployment Insurance Reauthorization, and Job Creation Act of 2010, signed into law by President Obama on December 17, 2010, extends and expands a wide variety of valuable tax breaks and includes tax provisions affecting individuals and businesses. Key highlights of the new law and their impact on charitable giving are below.

Special IRA Giving Extended Through 2011

When it comes to charitable giving, individuals can continue to make direct contributions from their IRA to qualified charities (like the Chi Phi Educational Trust) of up to \$100,000 and exclude the IRA distribution from their income. This special provision is only in effect until the end of 2011.

Top Estate Tax Rate Increases to 35%

The federal government increased the estate tax exemption to \$5 million, and also set the top estate tax payment rate at 35%. This basically means that individuals who have more than \$5 million in their gross estate upon death, may be required to pay as much as 35% of the value above \$5 million to the federal government. Careful estate planning techniques can reduce your tax burden and fund important charitable causes like a scholarship endowment for a Chi Phi student or your Chapter's Chapter Excellence Fund.
