## **Loos Named New** Chi Phi Executive

Randolph M. Loos (Randy to all) is Chi Phi's new Executive, assuming the position after confirmation by the Grand Council in Atlanta Dec. 2-3.

A 1977 University of Florida graduate in Finance, Loos came to Chi Phi from his position as Research Consultant with the Comptroller at rival Florida State University in Tallahassee. While there he served as Council Representative from the national fraternity, working with Nu Delta Chapter

"I solicit all the help and advice I can get from alumni, and strong assistance also from the men of our active chapters," says Loos. "I believe strongly in our fraternity, with confidence in its Past, Present and Future greatness."

Loos served as Alpha, Beta and Delta for Theta Delta chapter, currently Chi Phi's largest, and received the Carl J. Gladfelter Leadership Award as Chi Phi's National Active of the Year in 1977.

At Florida, Loos was named the Outstanding 1977 Graduate, receiving the award from Alfred C. Warrington IV ThD 58, then president of the UF Alumni Association.

He was president of Omicron Delta Kappa leadership honorary, and vice president of Florida Blue Key, the UF leadership/service group.

Under his presidency, Theta Delta celebrated its 40th Anniversary with a Founders Day program which included an orchestra featuring the sweet music of the 30s.

Loos was born in Warren, Ohio, but moved to Florida where he graduated from Sarasota High School before entering the University

A striking individual, 6 ft. 5" tall, slender, with a ready smile and businesslike manner, Loos is unmarried, with his major hobby being membership in a sought-after Barber Shop Quartet, currently Florida State Champions, begun during his college days and still singing together.

## **Donohue Leaves National Office**

Raymond J. Donohue Ome 61, National Director since the 1974 Sesquicentennial Congress, left the National Office on December 1, and will soon be entering private business.

Currently he is employed by the Chi Phi Educational Trust, and is updating the Trust's educational and promotional

# Nebraska Nets \$11,000 in Trust's 77-78 MD Drive



Sleeping bag helped and an umbrella, too, as Indiana Pole-a-Thon raised thousands for MD to kick off Chi Phi's Trust-backed 1978-79 effort last Fall, with Rhode Is.

Nearly \$11,000 was raised last year for Muscular Dystrophy by Alpha Theta Chi Chapter at Nebraska—the fourth straight year that chapter has led in the charity campaign sponsored by the Chi Phi Educational Trust aided by gifts from former Grand Alpha Joe Rice Dockery Xi 27. (See details on page 3.)

Nebraska's Dance Marathon has taken in over \$52,000 since it was begun in 1975. Last year the total actually sent to Muscular Dystrophy was \$10,949, and as a result the chapter may be asked to send representatives to Jerry Lewis'

Telethon Dance-a-Thon.

Another mammoth project was a state-wide Softball Tournament organized by Kappa Chapter at Wisconsin, which brought in a net of \$2,000 for MD—the first time Kappa participated.

Penn State's Alpha Delta Chapter was number three in donations for MD with \$1,554 with Balloon Days last April.

At Tennessee, Phi Delta raised \$670.88 with Pi Beta Phi cooperating by putting wheels on a bathtub and a (fullyclothed) co-ed inside, which rated two radio mentions and a four-column picture in a Knoxville paper. The tub was rolled five miles-from MD headquarters to the campus.

Six prizes were awarded for 1978 win-

ners by the Trust:

Chapter size awards went to Wisconsin as a large chapter, Penn State as a medium-sized chapter, and Tennessee as a small chapter.

Community size brought a prize to Nebraska for a large city, to Florida for a medium-sized city, and to West Virginia Wesleyan for a small city.

A participant for each of the six years since Muscular Dystrophy was adopted by Congress as a national charitable project, the University of Florida chapter raised \$433.75 in 1978, and West Virginia Wesleyan which has participated for five years raised \$370.63.

Three other chapters took part, but Chi Phi's Executive, Randy Loos, hopes that more will be helping this important charity in 1978-79. Already, Indiana's lota Delta Chapter reports raising \$2,380 in its week-long Pole-a-Thon Oct. 13-21 and Rho lota Kappa netted \$3500 from its flagpole sitting in September.

'The Trust is quite pleased with the response of our chapters to this worthy effort," says Mel Jessup HD 43, chairman for the Trust. "We also appreciate very much the aid which Bro. Dockery gives in making the program possible.'

## **Animal House:** Don't Miss It!

One of the funniest movies this writer has ever attended is "Animal House" the movie about two fraternities like none of us has ever seen.

One of these chapters does nothing by the book, the other does everything by the book. The reality of our own chapters should bear very little resemblance to either the mythical Delts or the mythical Omegas. But all Chi Phis will see a bit of both these chapters in their own fraternity experience.

Whether intended or not, this is a movie with a moral.

To be a real, honest to goodness, useful fraternity . . . useful to your own members and to your college ... you'd better be sure your chapter is preparing its actives for the real world.

Parties? Yes. Bacchanals? No. Personal achievement? Sure. Superiority? Destructive to your common sense.

Your chapter members must cooperate to stay alive-good advance knowledge for the young man who graduates and goes to work. Your chapter has to seek to help each member develop into a well-rounded, constructive citizen—not by rules alone but by that magic word, Friendship .... and that other magic word, Concern.

One writer thinks fraternities will become more alcoholic because of Animal House. This writer believes strongly that college students are not that impressionable.

## Want to Loan Money On a Chapter House?

Some alumni might find a well-secured mortgage on one of our Chi Phi houses financially beneficial to the lender as well as to the borrower.

For example, the Florida Chi Phi Association owns all four Florida houses. Currently, a balloon end mortgage on the Florida State chapter house is coming due. It is held by the individual who sold the house, but needs to be renewed on a permanent basis which may or may not be acceptable.

The property was recently appraised at a \$65,000 value, and the first mortgage sought will amount to \$35,000 or less. The Association has never missed making a mortgage payment on a first mortgage since it took ownership of the Theta Delta House in 1952. Going interest rates are paid.



## AThX MC Marathon Year-Long Project

by Steve Schneiderwind AThX 73 Awards, rewards, weary legs, and a great feeling of pride belong to the brothers at the University of Nebraska for their countless hours of hard work raising money for Muscular Dystrophy.

Four years of dance marathons held by the chapter have raised over \$52,000 for the fight against Dystrophy. Each of these four years the Alpha Theta Chi dance marathon has been the leading money raising project at Nebraska, and also Chi Phi's leader.

The elements for success? Simple!

First find a Brother who is willing to devote a full year of work to a job that requires more time than the Alpha's and that has more responsibility than the House Manager, Steward, Pledge Trainer and Treasurer combined.

Second, find a local radio station that will arrange music, announcers and radio advertisements.

Third, arrange to use the Student Union for 30 straight hours. Fourth, find two dozen local merchants to sponsor food, drinks, and prizes.

Finally, you will need to find at least 50 couples who will dance for 30 hours and who will seek advance donations for each hour that they dance

Each dance marathon is a full year's project which involves every Brother, pledge, Little Sister and many alumni.

The marathons are usually held during the first week of March beginning at 6 o'clock Friday evening and continuing until Saturday midnight. Live bands provide most of the music with the sponsoring radio station filling in with live broadcasts and taped music. The couples are allowed a four hour break from 4 a.m. to 8 a.m. on Saturday.

The dancing couples represent a large cross section of the University and the city of Lincoln. Most are recruited from other fraternities and sororities, and usually the largest number come from Chi Phi.

Each couple pays a \$5 entry fee for which they receive free food, drink and T-shirts. These couples are responsible for finding donors who will contribute money for each hour the couple dances. Donations usually run between 10 and 50 cents per hour. The 1977 Dance Marathon had one couple that was dancing for \$124 per hour.

When the dance marathon is over the leg weary dancers are rewarded with trophies and prizes.

### Massachusetts Institute of Technology

Some members of the Beta Chapter have gotten involved in numerous research and engineering activities through programs at MIT which are designed to give undergraduates hands-on experience in their field of study.

Jose L. Fernandez '79, has worked in the

Department of Muscle Research at the Boston Biomedical Research Institute. His project started as an attempt to purify and character-ize the calcium-independent (basal) ATPase, an enzyme found in muscle and believed to be related to calcium transport across the cell

Evidence suggested that the CA \*\*\*
dependent and "basal" ATPases were in fact
two different enzymes and that the latter was probably a mitochondrial contaminant. The work will result in a publication and will also be presented at the Annual Convention of the Biophysical Society in Atlanta next Feb-

Joel Tilienkamp '80, worked for The Delco Electronics division of General Motors in the area of automobile electronics. He worked with a team designing a mini-computer-based testing system to be used for production testing of the pollution control system to be introduced in cars of the latter half of model year 1979. This work was part of a General Motors Scholarship program. Mark Phillips '79, has done several

electronic design projects for Harvard Medical School. These include automatic feeding monitor systems for monkey cages and horse movement measuring devices in studying the accuracy of predicting a horse-

Rick Kocinski '80, is presently researching the feasibility of space solar-power stations with the Aero/Astro Department, while

Robert Towry '80 is developing a computer simulation of railroad traffic flow.

Doug Klapper '81, has finished a pollution control study for the Chemical Engineering Department and is now researching (at Harvard Medical School) more effective methods of administering drugs into the human hody.

of administering drugs into the human body.

## Gamma's Million **Dollar House Rises!**

Replacing Emory University's Chi Phi House, Tom Connally Hall, which burned Christmastime 1977, with relatively small enlargement is costing an amazing \$1.2 million, reports Mike Aycock G 69, president of the Gamma Trust Association.

Fortunately (and an instructive lesson for other alumni house associations), Gamma was covered by replacement value insurance under a University policy which allowed them to collect over \$827,000.

"We were extremely fortunate that the house was covered by Emory's replacement value insurance," states Aycock. "But simply replacing old Tom Connally Hall with the same structure would not have met the needs of 1979 and the years to come.

"The Trust decided that the new house should accommodate 40 instead of 32, and square footage is being increased from 15,000 in the old house to 18,000 in the new, with a full basement for dining and parties."

## Chi Phis in Higher Education—I Philip Keys Yonge, H 1871



## P. K. Yonge Laboratory School, U. of Florida

In 1905, Florida consolidated its colleges into three: University of Florida, Florida State, and Florida A. & M. College for Negroes. All were administered by the Board of Control (now the Board of Regents) and Philip Keys Yonge was an original appointee. He served until 1933, except for one 4-year period.

Born in Marianna, Fla., Yonge earned an A. B. at Georgia in 1871, and an A.M. and LL.B. in 1872, and there joined Chi Phi. After graduation, he became a resident of Pensacola, active in many civic endeavors. He was a Phi Beta Kappa at Georgia, and an honorary Phi Kappa Phi at Florida—which also gave him an honorary LL. D. degree during the period he was not in office.

Cooperation and practical common sense guided his actions, according to the Florida Historical Quarterly. He served 1905-1917, and 1921-1933, when he retired at age 83, dying one year later.

Significant of Dr. Yonge's career was the fact that he attended 336 of 340 Board of Control meetings during his long tenure, although its meetings were held several hundred miles from Pensacola, normally either in Tallahassee (225 miles) or Gainesville (385 miles).

Information about Dr. Yonge was gathered for The Chakett by Dr. Howard Weems G 48 ThD 48, entomologist with the Florida Department of Agriculture Plant Industry Technical Division, and currently advisor for Theta Delta chapter.

Dozens of college buildings throughout America are named after Chi Phis. The Chakett needs to know where they are, with pictures and biographical information.

Chi Phi's gain was 8.8% in 1978, with Kappa Alpha Order second with an increase of 8.6%.

College Survey Bureau, Inc., also reports that joining rules are the major "evil" facing fraternities because they force higher costs, snobbery, dishonesty, laziness and less members. Only 10% of fraternity chapters and no sorority chapters are free from forced rush rules.

# Xi Actives, Alums Help!



Xi Chapter's imposing home, Craigielea, at Cornell, was renovated 1970-1973, but since that time an additional \$68,873 was spent on repairs and furnishings, over a quarter of it from Actives and the balance from Alumni

Craigielea is nearly 90. Writes Edwin J. Fitzpatrick Xi 32, vice president of The Chi Phi Chapter House Association in a "Dear Xi" Newsletter:

"In our major renovation efforts from 1970 through 1973 we shut our eyes to many defects, especially in its nether regions, because at the time we couldn't

Much of the chapter's contribution is through \$350 a month set aside during each college year.

### **Big Ticket Items Come Yearly**

The largest expenditures during the past four years were:

\$16,750 spent for kitchen renovation in 1974, including replacement of range, refrigerator, compressor and disposall, and rebuilding of the dish washer.

In 1975, the main boiler was replaced at a cost of nearly \$21,000, and standby power for sprinkler and boiler system, plus other fire protection measures, added another \$11,000 plus.

In 1976, a retaining wall was replaced for \$18,700. In 1977, a concrete wall replaced crumbling masonry on the cellar stairway for \$3600, and in 1978 \$1500 went toward installation of permanent plastic double-paning in library, dining room and living room and foyer windows.

## **Actives Live Economically**

In addition to the money, Xi chapter Actives have expended thousands of man-hours to hold down the cost of many improvements, and also:

Xi members live simply and economically. They have a first-rate cook who prepares lunch and dinner daily except Sunday; he is their only employee. The members do their own housework, wait on table, wash dishes, scrub pots and tend the lawn.

The chapter has taken the selection of its officers quite seriously and, almost without exception, has elected competent and energetic Alphas, treasurers, stewards and house managers.

### **Insurance Costs Reduced**

Insuring Craigielea cost \$3000 in 1971; if its structure were unchanged, this cost today would be doubled.

Installing a sprinkler system reduced our insurance costs to \$1150 in 1972. And there were other cost reductions when the University took title to Craigielea. For improved coverages during the 1977-

78 college year, we paid \$445. The University's Bursar collects Xi's room-and-board bills with virtually 100% effectiveness. Unpaid bills have simply disappeared as a factor in Xi's finances.

## Alumni Dollars Dependable

Generous, dependable financial support by Xi's alumni has allowed your Chapter House Association to renovate and to maintain Craigielea on a pay-as-you-go

As a consequence, the burden of annual debt service carried by Xi Chapter is exactly zero. Several other fraternities at Cornell must meet debt service obligations in the order of \$3000 to \$12,000 per year.

Intangible but important: the deep interest and consistent support of Xi alumni has had and is continuing to have an affirmative impact on the undergraduate members' attitudes toward Chi Phi at Cornell.

## **Cornell's Strong Combination**

The active chapter is entitled to some quiet pride in having contributed 28.1% of the costs of Craigielea's improvements of the past five years.

But the other side of this coin is that 71.9% of those improvements wouldn't have happened if Xi alumni hadn't provided the means!

It is a fact of life, concludes Fitzpatrick, that our much-loved Craigielea, now age 88, will always require more tender care than a similar cubage of new steel and concrete. The undergraduates have contributed lots of dollars and elbow grease—but they still badly need our financial help.
