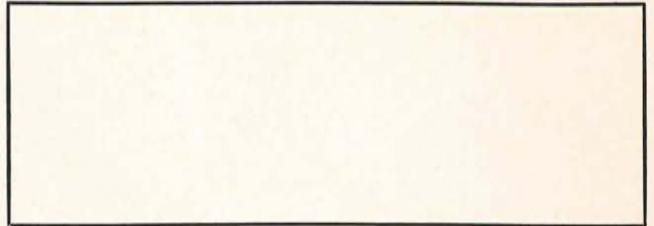

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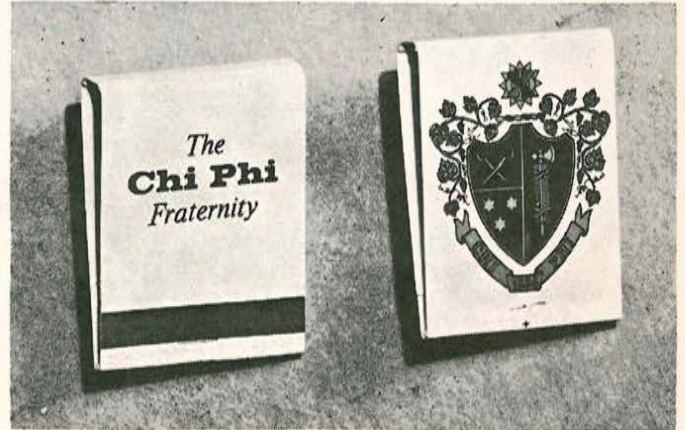

# LET'S TALK IT OVER...

## WHAT IS THE BEST FRATERNITY?

THE QUESTION IS HEARD, "What is the best fraternity?" Some persons have even worked out schemes whereby they have published lists of the standing of fraternities: first, second, third, etc.

My position would be that no one knows the best or second best. There are simply too many persons, known and unknown factors involved to pinpoint the fifth or eighth in standing.

Various fraternities emphasize as most important different things. Again fraternities can be strong in one geographical location and weak in another. Some chapters are consistently outstanding or weak and some chapters go up and down.

Are age, size, numbers, financial assets, scholarship, athletes, publications, alumni association the criteria?

A sober second thought brings me to the conviction that as much as we want to excel in outward attainments, something else calls for our evaluation.

The real measurement of a fraternity is: Is it a fraternity?

Old or young in years, do its members behave as a brotherly corporate body? Large or small in numbers, do the wearers of its badge have cohesiveness and dedication? Are its scholars or C students cultivated gentlemen? Are its athletes well-rounded men? Do its publications print something worth printing? Are its alumni still loyal to group effort that is mutually beneficial?

The only thing that ever beat a bad idea is a good idea. The test we must apply to ourselves is, "Do we really know who we are?" Are purposes, and aims high? Is our operation sound? Do we build better per-

sons? Do our ideals motivate men? Are we willing to be known by our products? Are the members of our Fraternity the finest, highest-minded, most dedicated and most useful persons we know?

The best fraternity is best because it has the best record of persons of the best character. The fraternity should build this in its members. The fraternity man shall give this testament in the name of his fraternity.—From *The Communicator*, a publication of the Southeastern Interfraternity Conference.

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# Summer Job Search Program Begins

THE CHI delegates to the 1966 Congress proposed that the Fraternity develop a job placement program for seniors. Congress recommended the implementation of such a program and placed the matter in the Council's hand to be developed when funds and time were available. The idea was discussed with a number of chapter members during 1966-67 and the consensus of opinion seemed to be that the first step should be the development of a summer job placement program.

A pilot program is now underway. Interested Chi Phis who are now seniors or will be in the senior class in September are in the process of completing and returning a personal data sheet. Each man has been asked to name the kind of work (sales, engineering, etc.) and the location he prefers. This and other pertinent information, such as each Chi Phi's academic field and grade point average, will be arranged by city and state, printed, and distributed throughout the United States to hundreds of personnel managers. From this point on, a company will correspond directly with the brother in whom it has an interest.

It is felt that by arranging the list of job seekers by state and city, a company representative's review of candidates will be greatly simplified. Many students rely on summer earnings to help defray school costs. These men's first consideration is finding work in their home city.

The Summer Job Development program needs widespread assistance from alumni in a position either to hire a program participant directly or to provide names of personnel representatives willing to review the list of applicants. If your company or organization is hiring college students this summer, or if you are aware of a firm that will do so, the Placement Committee Chairman, Paul C. Gaertner, Jr., urges that you contact him immediately at the following address:

The company representative receiving the list may have no interest in discussing employment with the men on the list, and is under no obligation to either you or the fraternity. However, the committee has set a goal of providing substantial exposure for our summer job candidates. Any help you can give in attaining the goal will be very much appreciated.

Should the pilot program prove to be successful, the committee plans to extend the service to our sophomore and junior class members in 1969.

# NeVeR A DULL MOMeNT

*The Story of Harry C. Lewis*

A SLENDER, fortyish looking man walked briskly through the construction scene up to the manager's office at the Statler Hilton in Los Angeles. In an irate tone he addressed the executive greeting him and decried the fact the hotel's swimming pool was in the midst of repairs while the temperature outside registered a nifty 85 degrees.

The task of comforting the ruffled feelings of this guest who had driven some 2,000 miles from Michigan for the apparent dual purpose of attending a national barbershop quartet convention as well as taking a swim under the California sun was no easy assignment. Still it amounts to but a tiny part of the daily routine falling upon the broad shoulders of Harry C. "Pete" Lewis, 41-year old resident manager of the 1,300 room hostelry and member of Eta Delta Chapter (U.S.C. '49).

According to Lewis such quarter hour verbal barrages at the hands of hotel guests are rare. Most of his average 14-hour days are spent keeping an eagle eye on the hotel's multi-million dollar budget, supervising its 800-plus employees, and overseeing the operation of a virtual city within itself.

It is also estimated that as many as 50 letters may be written by him each day. Some of these are to answer compliments or complaints, set up reservations, solicit convention business, and make inquiries.

The correspondence coming into a major hotel dwarfs even the most popular movie star. Guests who have taken linen as souvenirs have been known to have pangs of conscience by returning the articles or its equivalent value.

Lewis recently received a rather delayed reaction pang. A guest who had stayed at the hotel in 1953 and absconded with a pillowcase sent a letter and check for it some 14 years later.

"Hotel guests are generally the most considerate people you can find", said Lewis. "If there is construction going on or some other inconvenience, as long as they are told about it in advance there is never any complaint. It is when no notice is given that the problems arise".

Actually public relations occupies a major portion of a resident manager's time. No problem can ever be con-



sidered too small to brush aside lest it comes back to haunt.

Lewis himself may have been headed for a professional P. R. career until he got into the hotel business almost by accident. He had majored in advertising at U.S.C. and following his graduation had gone to work in the advertising department of Hoffman Radio Corporation (now Hoffman Electronics).

When the Statler Hotel was under construction in Los Angeles in 1952, he contacted the management about creating the position of advertising director. Instead they offered him the post of sales representative which he finally accepted and started from scratch learning the hotel field.

Lewis spent the next few years knocking on doors of major industries selling them on the idea of a convention at the Statler Hilton. The hotel became one of the nation's busiest and attracted guests from the 50 states and all over Europe and South America.

He now held the position of director of sales and entertained VIP's of commerce and industry. During his stay he worked on the arrangements for two visits of President Dwight Eisenhower to the Statler Hilton.

"This was a thrilling experience for all of us and plenty of work", related Lewis. "Secret servicemen arrived a month ahead of the presidential visit and every employee from the janitor to the general manager had to be given a security clearance".

He then explained how a vast communications network had to be installed by the telephone company. Facilities for the local and national press corps had to be set up and the hotel checked inch by inch.

The Statler Hilton actually became the "White House" during these two short visits and all department heads were required to work around the clock to assure a smooth operation.

In 1962 Lewis was appointed Western sales manager for the Hilton Hotels Corporation and supervised the



sales departments of hotels in California, Oregon, Colorado, New Mexico and Texas. Three years later, J. C. Meacham, veteran general manager of the Statler Hilton, asked him to return to the hotel as resident manager.

One of his first undertakings was the initiation of a \$2½ million rehabilitation program to encompass the entire hotel over a two year period. He plunged into the project like an average homeowner planning an addition to his house.

Instead of 500 square feet of space, however, Lewis found himself staring at over 200,000 square feet consisting of bedrooms, living rooms, ballrooms, restaurants and lobby space. There was also the matter of 34 miles of hallway space spread over 15 floors.

As in any such program, a meeting of the minds with the decorators, contractors, corporate management, and the hotel's executive staff had to be accomplished before the work could begin.

Lewis brought his "public relations" back into play and though there were some anxious moments, all guest rooms have now been given the new look with a number of innovations. For instance, instead of the usual hotel corridors, the Statler Hilton has introduced a colorful street effect with lamp posts and cobblestone floor coverings leading to each room.

The lobby has been enriched with bright red carpeting while a fireplace has been added. Walnut pillars have encased the former marble columns and Old English-type lamps were placed on the walls.

Now that the Los Angeles Statler Hilton is a "new" hotel once again, Lewis is busier than ever. Rather than resting on his laurels after 24 months of construction work, it's now necessary to pay for the program by attracting new business to the hotel.

Every moment in the life of a resident manager is full of something different and Lewis wouldn't trade the excitement for anything. One occupation he does miss are the good old days on the golf course. His duffering has disappeared since he left the sales department.

Still he does have time for a couple of hobbies: photography and the study of California history (he's an unusual breed—a second generation born in Fresno.)

Lewis is married to his boyhood sweetheart, the former Janet Jurgens, and lives in the Los Angeles suburb of Cheviot Hills with their two children, Peter, 16, and Pamela, 12.

And now that the Statler Hilton's swimming pool is brimming once again with water, he happily looks forward to each new day and the assured excitement and problems it will bring.

## Old Pi Chapter To Be Reestablished

### *Meeting and Reunion March 13*

AFTER AN ABSENCE of 32 years, Chi Phi will return to the historic Ames Campus and endeavor to reactivate the chapter.

All Pi (Iowa State) and alumni from other chapters residing in Iowa are urged to attend the kickoff meeting, Wednesday, March 13, 1968, at 6:00 P.M., Room 39, Iowa State Memorial Union, Ames. The National Director and Assistant Director will be present to outline the program. The arrangements for the meeting are being handled by Herbert Arthur, Pi '25, Ames; A. H. Pickford, Pi '15, Des Moines; A. O. Ludwig, Pi '33, Perry; and J. C. Schilleter, Pi '23, Ames.

A letter to the Council signed by Dean Paul R. McQuilkin set the stage for the reactivation. He states "I am pleased to inform you that the University Committee on Fraternities and Sororities in a meeting on February 5 granted recognition to Chi Phi Fraternity. The way is now clear for you to begin colonization on the Iowa State University campus.

"Please keep me informed as to current plans in this colonization effort. I hope by the time you arrive on the Iowa State campus that I.F.C. will be in a position to provide all of the help you may deem necessary.

"If there is anything I can do to aid you in this colonization effort prior to the time you arrive on campus, do not hesitate to call upon me."

Pi was established in 1922. On the

morning of November 25, 1933, fire broke out in the house of the Pi Chapter at Iowa State and completely destroyed the interior. Sixteen of the brothers were sleeping at the time on the third floor. As the fire had started in a davenport in the hallway, when the inmates were aroused, the lower part of the house was a mass of flames. In escaping thirteen of the brothers were more or less seriously burned or otherwise injured. But they all finally recovered. The injured were taken to the nearby Pi Kappa Alpha House for shelter. The furniture and equipment were an almost total loss. The evening before the fire the chapter had entertained the members of the Alpha Gamma Delta Sorority in an exchange party and a mislaid cigarette was blamed for the fire. Efforts were immediately made to rebuild, and a questionnaire to the alumni brought the advice to rebuild a small house rather than to attempt to remodel.

Crippled by the disastrous fire which destroyed the chapter house, discouraged by their inability to raise sufficient funds to rebuild, and not being able, in the absence of a proper house, to compete with their rivals on the campus, after a conference with the Grand Alpha, the active members surrendered their charter to the Council in 1935, and at the meeting of the 1936 Congress in New York the charter was suspended.

The spirit of Chi Phi has been kept

alive there many years by a loyal group of Pi alumni. The following report from Brother Herb Wilkinson attests to their spirit and hope.

Back in 1944 a group of Chi Phi alumni from the old Pi Chapter at Iowa State University at Ames, Iowa, gathered for what has turned out to be the first in a long series of annual Homecoming luncheons which keep the spirit of the fraternity alive and glowing.

The Oak Room at the Memorial Union was the scene this year on October 21, and before going to the stadium to watch the game with Missouri, here were the Chi Phis who met to talk of old times and peer hopefully toward the future: Harold Pickford, '15, Des Moines; Adolph Ludwig, '33, Perry; Fred Ludwig, '29, Laurens; Herbert A. Arthur, '25, Ames; John Jessup, '21, Perry; Leslie E. Thayer, '27, Storm Lake; Clint Horlacher, '27, Storm Lake; L. B. "Bud" Hoopes, '17, Muscatine; A. M. Wenzholz, '16, Winthrop; Herb Wilkinson, '17, DeWitt, all of Iowa, and Wayne Sutherland, '21, Sioux Falls, South Dakota.

Brothers Pickford and Arthur reported on the visit of National Director Carl J. Gladfelter to the Iowa State campus last April. Brother Adolph Ludwig read a number of messages from Pi Chapter members who could not be present. Guests brought the total number at the luncheon to 27.



# DAVIS—'A Campus On The Move'

*University of California — Davis Site of Newest Colony*

CHI PHI officially started a Colony on the 62 year old Davis Campus of the University of California on January 14, 1968.

Nine men were pledged during the last two weeks of January by the colonizing team of Robert Clark, Lambda '62, Frank Merlo, Lambda '63 and the members of the Lambda chapter and the Big Valley Alumni Association. The Assistant National Director, "Chuck" Wilson helped coordinate the program.

The response by Davis men has been tremendous. "We have picked only the best", according to Wilson, "and they compare with the best men in any of our chapters. This is what impresses me most."

Davis was first visited by the National Director and Brother Richard Ham, Lambda '33, Grand Gamma in the early 60's. Contact was maintained by the Council and the many alumni living in the Sacramento area. Final approval to colonize was granted during the spring of 1967.

## *A Great Agriculture School*

The campus of nearly 4,000 acres has changed radically since its beginnings in 1906 as a farm school for the rural youth of California. Set in the rich farmland of the great Central Valley of California, it has played a major role through the years in developing scientific farmers and scientific agriculture for the growing state and nation. The influence of the Davis campus on the state's number one industry is seen in the large number of influential leaders who have attended UCD and in the highly mechanized and specialized agriculture, much of which was pioneered on the campus. Two recent examples of mechanization are a tomato harvester and a lettuce harvester prototype. In addition, agricultural scientists at Davis have styled crop varieties to California's irrigation system to carry water from the northern part of the state to the southern areas.

Through the years, the fame of the agricultural campus

has spread to all parts of the world—attested to by the large number of students from other countries who are attracted to Davis to study. Some 70 countries are represented among the students at Davis, giving a cosmopolitan air to the campus.

Great though the agricultural reputation of the campus is, it is being equaled in many newer areas developing at Davis. As the state population has grown, the need for more educational centers has grown with it, the Davis campus has expanded. Just after World War II, a School of Veterinary Medicine was established; in 1951, a College of Letters and Science, and more recently a College of Engineering and School of Law. The first class in the new School of Medicine will enroll this fall (1968).

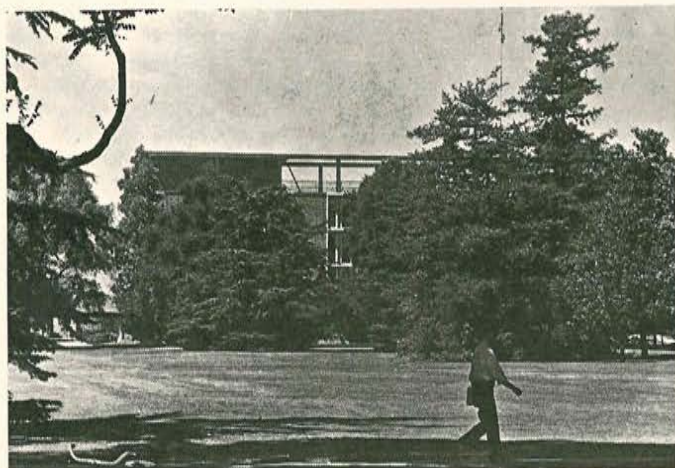
## *10,000 Students*

From a small farm school of a few students in the early days of this century, the campus has grown to its present size of 10,000 students (about one-half women) majoring in nearly every educational area. In looking to the future, the campus academic plan is geared to an eventual enrollment of 15,000 students plus 3500 in the professional schools—law, medicine, and veterinary medicine. Future plans also call for development of a graduate School of Administration in the next few years.

In its few years (less than 10) as a general campus of the University, the Davis campus has attracted a faculty of outstanding individuals in the arts, social sciences, basic sciences, and humanities, as well as law and the health sciences. For example, in a recent issue of *Saturday Review*, Davis was singled out as being "the real avant-garde music center of Western universities." Students are flocking to Davis to major in the letters and sciences—of the 7700 undergraduates, nearly 75 percent are in this college. Agriculture now includes 15 percent of the undergraduates—enrollment is not falling in this area, but the ratio is changing as the campus continues to expand.

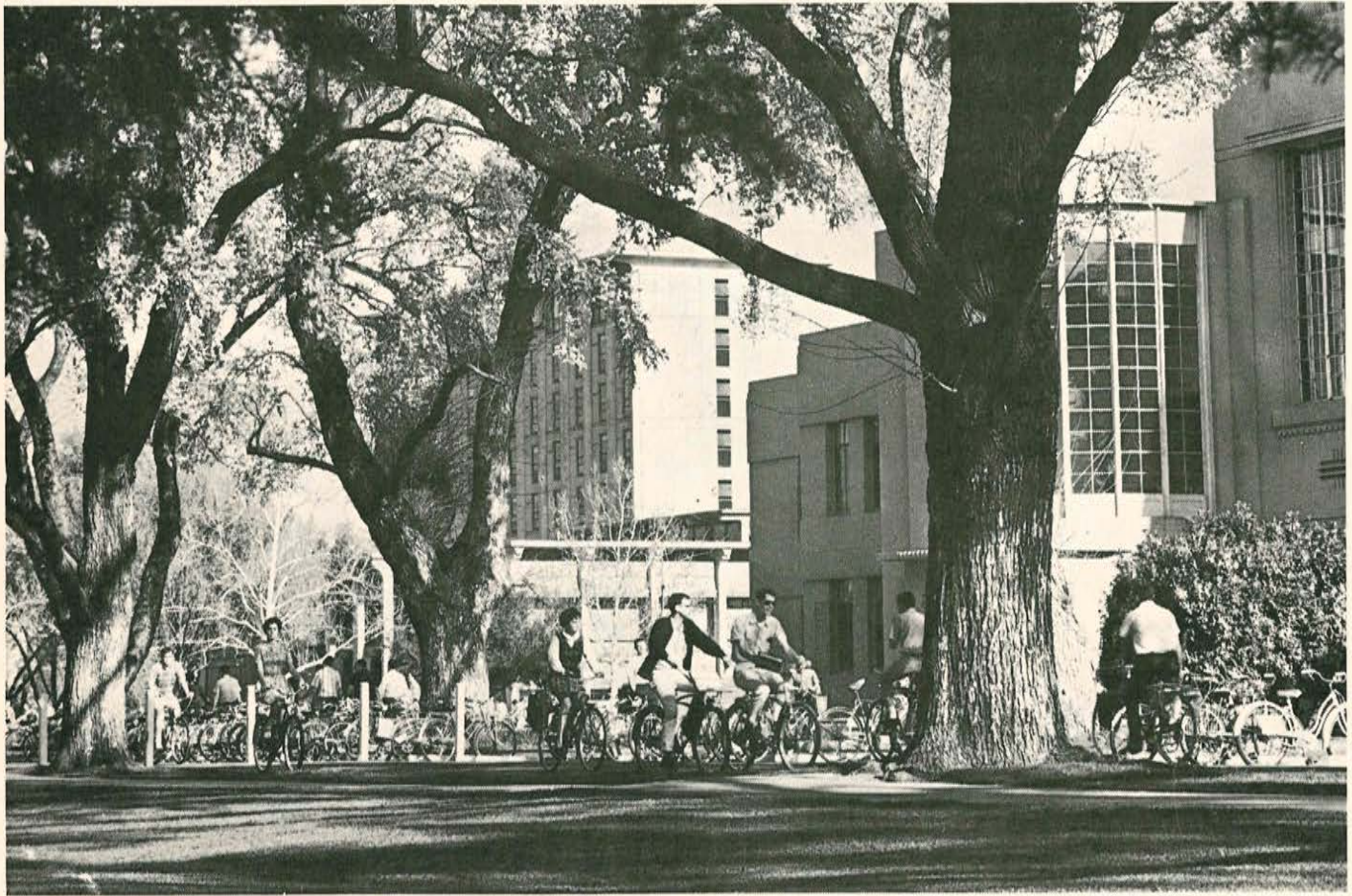
## *Past Traditions Strong*

In all this growth, and change, the campus still holds to traditions and attitudes from its early days. One of these is the dedication of the campus to the service of California. This continues and is obvious in many more areas than just services to the agricultural industry. Other publics are being served, and the students themselves have developed many programs to assist those less fortunate. One of these is the annual Cal Aggie campus the students hold each summer for disadvantaged children in nearby communities. Students act as counselors and finance the annual campus program for two weeks each summer in the Sierra. Another project of the students is their Study Center, where they assist disadvantaged students in their studies in neighboring cities. Students are also active in Project Amigos, and fraternity groups are particularly active in helping underprivileged students at Christmas. A current project of the Greek community

is raising money for a fund that is given as scholarships which are directed toward increasing the enrollment of minority group students at Davis.

Another tradition of the campus is the Honor Spirit, which means no proctors watch over examinations. This personal responsibility extends to other areas of student life, and the students have a strong self government on the campus. In expanding to meet needs of today's students, the students also have become more active in the area of educational reform in recent years. One result is the establishment of an "experimental college," attracting a large number of students for a variety of student-organized seminar-type sessions. And students are now serving on special faculty committees to study possible new approaches to formal education on the campus.

Students also have a major voice in the operations of the campus, serving on more than a dozen administrative committees appointed by the Chancellor, Emil M. Mrak. These committees include campus development, student conduct, arts and lectures, and athletics, among others.

Another tradition of Davis is the friendly, casual atmosphere of the campus. This is evident in the general attitude of students and faculty members on the campus and most of all in Chancellor Mrak's "open door" policy for students. They have top priority when they wish to see him.

### *Chi Phi to be 13*

The spirit of friendliness—often called the "Hi Aggie" spirit—is one of the traditions that fraternities foster.

These groups, dating back to the first years of the campus, have provided much of the continuity from one student generation to the next. Many of these groups were local in origin and affiliated with national fraternities through the years. There are now twelve fraternities at Davis, with Chi Phi to be number 13.

The bakers' dozen includes (in order of age at Davis): Alpha Gamma Rho, Phi Sigma Kappa, Theta Xi, Kappa Sigma, Sigma Alpha Epsilon, Sigma Nu, Delta Sigma Phi, Phi Delta Theta, Sigma Phi Epsilon, Delta Upsilon, Phi Kappa Tau, Theta Chi, and Chi Phi.

Members of these groups play an important role in all phases of campus life. Fraternities have the highest grade-point-averages of any men's living groups on the campus, they are well represented in student government, and they include many of the top campus athletes among their membership.

One phenomenal athletic development of recent years, in which fraternities have certainly won their share of honors, is the intramural program on the campus. Even the coeds are much involved in the program with their powder puff football, spurred by cheers from fraternity members.

Among the special programs of the fraternity group are fund raising activities during Greek Week to help fund the Cal Aggie Camp.

The fraternities, though not the dominant force, are a major force in campus life at Davis. This is one campus where they are growing and expanding—keeping pace with the "campus on the move" spirit as Davis marks its 62 year and the University of California its 100 year.



# CAMPUS AND ALUMNI BRIEFS

## Florida Bar Headed by W. P. Simmons

WILLIAM P. SIMMONS, JR., Theta Delta 1935 became the President of the Florida Bar Association on June 24, 1967. The presidency of the Florida Bar is an especially high honor in Florida where all lawyers and judges must be members of the organized Bar in order to practice law. In effect, Brother Simmons is the ranking lawyer in the State of Florida.

Brother Simmons graduated from the University of Florida in 1934 with degrees of Bachelor of Arts and Bachelor of Laws. He was initiated into the Theta Delta chapter when chapter was chartered in 1935. As an undergraduate he earned many honors, the foremost being a member of Florida Blue Key Leadership Organization.

During the first five years of his career he was Assistant Counsel, Florida Railroad Commission. In 1941 he entered the Army, and was discharged in 1945 with rank of Colonel, having served in five campaigns in Northern Europe with the 28th Infantry Division.

Since 1945 he has been associated with the law firm of Shutts & Bowen, Miami, Florida. He became a senior partner in 1954. Three years later in 1957 he was elected president of the Dade County Bar Association, in 1961 he was elected a Governor of the Florida Bar and has served in that capacity to date.

## Jay Winters, Alpha Chi '26 Achieves Honor

AMONG FIVE former outstanding "Batling Bishops" to be inducted into the Ohio Wesleyan University Athletic Hall of Fame at Homecoming, 1967, was Brother Jay Winters, Alpha-Chi '26, of Bucyrus, Ohio.

First bestowed in 1961, this high honor has now gone to a total of forty-four past athletes and coaches. In addition to Brother Winters' bringing distinction to Chi Phi this past year, was the selection of his brother, the late Lingel "Sunny" Winters, Alpha-Chi '24, in 1963.

To be eligible for nomination, an athlete must have achieved an outstanding all-around undergraduate record and have earned at least two letters in one sport or one letter in two or more sports. Selection to the Hall of Fame is made prior to Homecoming by a ten-man committee, headed by University President, Elden T. Smith.

Brother Jay Winters earned three letters in football and one letter in track from 1922-26. He captained and quarterbacked the Bishop "Frosh," and proved masterful in executing new plays successfully. Although hampered in his junior year by injuries, he lettered the next two seasons, and as a senior, was named both captain and quarterback of the All-Ohio football squad of 1925. John Dietrich, then of the Cleveland Plain Dealer called Winters, "the heart of the powerful Wesleyan offense, and the best field general in the conference." When asked to name an All-Wesleyan football team selected from the squads he coached for 20 years, George Gauthier began by naming Jay Winters as quarterback of the "mythical eleven."

Brother Winters' latest recognition brings honor not only to himself but also to Alpha-Chi Chapter and to Chi Phi. His example typifies the ideal character of the Fraternity.

## Younglove Story Draws Several Responses

A BRIEF STORY on Roy S. Younglove, M '01, S '13 brought many responses, Brother Younglove writes. The first received was a postal card from "Undy" at Palm Springs and his wife, dated May 19. The second was from Charles Holmes Bradley, kid brother of Edgar Bradley who was my classmate at Stevens Tech in the Mu Chapter. He now lives at Crosswicks, N. J., a little Quaker village near Trenton. He was born Feb. 2, 1887 in Jersey City, so is now eighty years old, and was initiated at Cornell, Xi Chapter, May 7, 1908 and transferred to University of California, Lambda Chapter in class 1910. He refers back to early days in Mu Chapter and to another brother Chester, who was in Mu '03 but died in October 1912.

The third was from Don Lewis, son of Nate Lewis who was a classmate of mine at Stevens. Don came to some of our five year class reunions with his dad who had become blind. Don now lives in Bradford, R. I. and is blind, on the old family farm.

The fourth was from G. R. Carpenter and dated May 23 from San Francisco. He was in Dartmouth 1910 and in same class with Dusty Craft and Paul Albert and Don Bryant, all of whom I knew in Chicago prior to 1919. ## National Interfraternity Conference Rebuffs Inciters of Civil Disturbances

THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY of the National Interfraternity Conference leveled a stern rebuke to the inciters of civil disturbances in the form of a special resolution at its 59th annual meeting in New York City.

The Conference singled out for its censure the current rash of mass disturbances such as picketing selective service headquarters, destroying military records and draft cards, and supporting the activities of any organizations attempting to discredit the United States government and its military agencies.

As proposed by its resolution committee and adopted by unanimous vote, the Conference "deplored any act cast-

ing aspersions on the United States of America . . . or promoting or otherwise supporting organizations whose stated or implied purpose is to obstruct, impede or otherwise bring discredit upon the United States of America, its government and military activities and, thereby, directly or indirectly aiding present and potential enemies of this country."

Dr. Fred H. Turner, outgoing president of the Conference and retiring dean of students at the University of Illinois, referred the resolution to the executive committee of the Conference and thence to each of its 61 member fraternity organizations for further study and appropriate action.

### Receives Conservation Award

CONGRESSMAN JOHN P. SAYLOR (R-Pa.) was awarded the Belle W. Baruch Conservation prize in December 1967 by Harrison E. Salisbury, Assistant Managing Editor of the New York Times and Chairman of the Awards Committee of the Belle W. Baruch Foundation.

In announcing the award, Mr. Salisbury referred to Brother Saylor as the "Father of the Wilderness Act, a milestone in the field of conservation". He said the legislation "spells out a basic national policy" which assures protection of wilderness lands.

John P. Saylor is a Republican from Pennsylvania. His district which he has served for many years includes Johnstown, Pa., his present home and birthplace. The Congressman attended Franklin & Marshall and later the University of Michigan. He practiced law before his election.

In receiving the prize which carries with it a \$2,000 honorarium Congressman Saylor said, "Persuading Americans to keep areas unspoiled required a substantial effort over the years, but the eventual result—delineated in the Wilderness Act and other legislation—was adequate satisfaction. The Baruch prize is an unexpected honor that would not have been possible without the inspiration and help that came from devoted conservationists of America".



# Books and Chi Phi Authors

**CLIMBING JACOB'S LADDER**—Pat Watters, Gamma '51 and Reese Cleghorn, Gamma '50, Harcourt, Brace and World, Inc., publishers.

A MILLION more votes in the past five years have brought Negro Southerners more fully into the country's political life, but their hopefulness cannot be "indefinitely disappointed by the routines of American democracy."

This is one of the main points of a new book reporting Negroes' struggle for the ballot in the South and its role in re-shaping the civil rights movement, the South, and the political balance within the nation as a whole.

The book, *Climbing Jacobs' Ladder*, by Pat Watters, and Reese Cleghorn, was published last November. Watters is the Information Director of the Southern Regional Council, and Cleghorn is the Associate Editor of the *Atlanta Journal*.

The book is grounded in previously unpublished documents, many of them rich, informal reports from the field, of the Student Nonviolent Coordinating Committee, the Southern Christian Leadership Conference, the NAACP, the Congress of Racial Equality, the Urban League, and local Negro organizations throughout the South.

For three years, before the "black power" doctrine and other developments split the civil rights movement, these organizations joined efforts under the Voter Education Project of the Southern Regional Council. The authors reveal how the project was inaugurated by rights organizations and foundations with the encouragement of the then Attorney General, Robert F. Kennedy, as a politically hopeful alternative to more unruly methods of claiming equality under the law.

They criticize the Justice Department for failure to make adequate efforts to fulfill a promise to protect workers in the voter registration effort. Thirteen rights workers were killed between 1962 and 1967.

They conclude that a dying "southern vote" in Congress restrained the federal government from taking more incisive action.

One of the main contentions of the book is evidence that the harshness of white resistance in tougher areas of the South radicalized much of the civil rights movement, spawned the

"black power" doctrine, and turned reform efforts toward basic national illnesses such as poverty, the nation's fixation on violence, and deep-running racist attitudes.

The authors make these points, among others:

—The growth of the Negro vote in major non-southern cities between 1940 and 1960 counter-balanced the political power of the old "Solid South" and turned the federal government toward enforcement, at last, of constitutional guarantees that had been ignored.

—The 1964 election, in which Negro votes prevented Barry Goldwater from carrying four and possibly five southern states, broke the old "Solid South" and the influence of the Black Belt areas of the South over the rest of the nation.

—Negroes will have to supplement traditional political methods with new approaches to make their full weight felt, partly because of a shortage of middle-class leadership.

—Because of "ticket balancing" in the future, the growing two-party system will prove to be Negroes' greatest ally in coming into a full sharing of political power. "Barring some fluke of circumstance," the authors say, "the South's first elected Negro state attorney general or lieutenant governor since Reconstruction will be the creature of the two-party system."

Throughout the civil rights struggle in the South, public perception has been limited, the authors suggest, partly because it has usually been focused upon dramatic conflicts rather than the essence of the struggle. What has been a mighty moral struggle unique in the nation's history usually has been seen as "just one more ball game," the authors say, and unless understanding of the issues at hand deepens the nation will move increasingly toward bitterness, chaos, and denial of its own ideals.

The book recounts how many of the most militant young civil rights workers moved from belief in the best idealism of America to believing the worst about America. This erosion of faith, now seen in its national impact, mainly arose from the South's and the nation's denials of the most basic element of democracy, the right to vote.

This development came step-by-

step with totalitarian-style repressions in Black Belt counties of the South; murder and brutality in the Mississippi Freedom Summer of 1964; and the ordeal of Selma.

The authors conclude that these rights workers' experiences with the worst poverty of the nation's poorest region bred a belief that not only was white society cruelly callous about the suffering of people, but that American institutions were incapable of curing the illness.

The book suggests that a big question in 1967 is whether the political process can accommodate demands by Negroes for removal of their disadvantage before despair and destructiveness replace a still-prevalent hopefulness among Negro Southerners.

Another question raised by the book is whether the Negro movement in the South can succeed where the northern movement has failed so far: in making the laws breathe into society and the lives of people a sense of equality and justice so that cynicism about American institutions will not grow past the point of no return.

The *Library Journal* says: "This book will probably stand as the definitive history of that period."

**BEYOND CONQUEST**—Edgar E. Daniels, A-X '25, Pageant Press, publishers.

**BEYOND CONQUEST**, is a probing love story combining analysis with the story of a woman unaware of her own potentialities. The characters are, although fictional, made real by the incisive construction the author has given to their individual characteristics. The book is published by Pageant Press and is priced at \$4.50.

The story itself takes the reader inside the heroine, becoming part of her life from the minute she appears on the first page, through all her activities and romantic interludes, ending on a note of hope for the future.

Brother Edgar E. Daniels was born in Elkins, West Virginia, received his B.A. and M.A. at the University of Southern California and his Ph.D. at the University of Vienna in Austria. He became a psychoanalyst at the Vienna Psychoanalytic Institute in Austria and, with the exception of serving in World War II, has been in private practice in Long Beach, California, since that time.

*Beyond Conquest* characterizes how in this century of cultural changes, wherein woman has found her freedom, she is not sure what to do with it.
