

LET'S TALK IT OVER...

PRIOR TO Congress, selected delegates from five regions were asked to present to Congress, their observation of the Fraternity-Sorority situation as observed in their section of the country. The following are highlights taken from three of the reports. I do not believe any additional comments are necessary.

SOUTH—George A. Pyle, Theta Delta

'70, University of Florida

"The Greek organizations are now stressing individuality rather than group

conformity.

"I feel optimistic about the future in the south. As the conditions which affect the youth change, however, the traditions must continue to adopt to the environment on each individual campus while continuing the thread of unity from the past."

MID-WEST—Donald Rowlands, Alpha Theta Chi '71, University of Nebraska

"The over used but none the less valid fact that 'individualism' is the password on the campus.

"Greeks must strive to maintain the group either formally or informally,

in order to remain functional.

"Only a tolerant university community coupled with financial stability will permit our brotherhood to continue."

WEST COAST—Michael Gravett, Epsilon

Delta '73, Oregon State University

"We are having problems due to such factors as: a new emphasis on individualism, increasing liberalism on the campus, and in some cases resistance from the administration.

"We feel, however, that our greatest threat comes from the recent improvement of the dormitories and apartments . . Administration policies concerning dorm living has been relaxed thus adding to their living desirability.

"Priorities have changed. Whereas in the past group conformity has been important, we now stress cohesiveness

and group cooperation.

"In summary, the days of fraternities competing against one another for rushees are gone. Now we must be able to compete against the dormitory and apartment as well."

A Message to the 1970 Congress

The above quote and following remarks were taken verbatim from a talk delivered by Brother Sanders to the 1970 Chi Phi Leadership Conference and Congress, held in Atlanta, September 4, 5, and 6, 1970.

I hope all of you are making the most of the tremendous opportunities you have in the field of higher education . . . and I hope you will take full advantage of the opportunities you have in the inter-fraternity system to develop qualities of leadership . . . and I hope that you will use those things in practical ways in politics and government in the years to come.

I don't know of any other place in American society today where real, sensible leadership is needed any more than it is needed on the college campus.

That statement may sound a little rhetorical to you . . . but because I do believe it so deeply I'd like to take a few minutes and reflect with you on what I regard as the critical need for sensible leadership on the college campus.

Most of you, wherever you are in school, have come into contact with members of the so-called "new left", who have attempted to convince you that America is run by a "military-industrial complex", or "war-mongering imperialists", or "Facist pigs". They may very well have attacked you as being uninvolved, complacent "Greeks".

No New Left

THERE IS NOTHING NEW about this new left. They are as old as people in any society who have wanted to take easy ways out of tough problems, who have tried to dismiss exceedingly complex issues with a shrug and a slogan.

I am talking about the student militants who have reduced the educational process to a shambles at many of our finest schools. At best, these self-proclaimed prophets are following a misguided theory of pragmatism which argues that as long as one considers a goal morally right, then he is justified in using any means whatsoever to attain it.

At worst, they are total anarchists, frankly out to completely wreck the fabric of our society.

I have always felt that these extremists who receive so much publicity for their acts of vandalism and revolution are but a small minority of today's young people. I am convinced that most people your age realize that those students who take over buildings, oust deans and present lists of "unnegotiable demands" are destroying the very freedom they claim so loudly to be practicing.

As leaders at your various schools, and especially as fraternity men, you have a special opportunity, and a special responsibility. If I read correctly the mood of many students such as yourselves, it is something like this:

You think our society is far from perfect. There are many, many things you would like to see changed, and you are willing to go along with us in the older generation, and attempt to bring about that change through orderly processes.

My Generation Must Reach Yours

It is my contention that if my generation does not make an all-out attempt to reach these young people, and I know I am speaking to many of you in the audience today, we run a grave risk of losing you to the radicals,




Two Undergraduates Named on Expanded Council

BROTHER WILLIAM JECKELL, Iota '34, following his election to a second term, announced the reappointment of all Council members serving during his first term of office. He also appointed Thomas Scarponcini, PIK '72 and Mark Huggins, A-A '71 to the Council.

Brother Scarponcini and Huggins are probably the first two undergraduates to serve on the Council, since the Union of the Three Orders in 1874. The 1970 Con-

gress adopted legislation expanding the Council from eight to ten members following a recommendation of the ad hoc Look Forward Committee that two undergraduates be added to the Council. The constitutional

amendment adopted provides that two undergraduate members will be appointed annually to serve for one academic year, and that they and the chapter they represent may not be appointed to a successive term.

Brother Jeckell served as Grand Delta under several Grand Alpha's before his election to the office in

1968. He and his wife Betty reside in suburban Cincinnati. They have two daughters, one married and living in Cincinnati, the other teaches school in Columbus, Ohio.

The Grand Alpha is Vice President and Regional Manager of Commercial Credit Corporation.

and thereby broadening even further the already legendary generation gap. This gap is already a wide gulf making communication between young and old exceedingly difficult.

And it seems to me that without accepting in the slightest the methods sometimes employed . . . student activists are often demanding nothing more than that our education and political processes be more relevant to them by involving them more directly on a day-to-day basis.

As I see it, the demand for relevance has taken two main forms. The first is an increased insistence that students be given more say in matters of curriculum planning, hiring practices, admissions policy, and generally the overall governing of a college community.

Perhaps I am being overly idealistic, but I am convinced that these students are not asking for an easy way out. What they are doing . . . what you are doing . . . I think . . . is searching for something to hang on to . . . something that will be meaningful to you within the context of a morning newspaper as well as a final exam.

The second primary form of the demand for relevance has concerned itself with the study of history.

The young study the past in the belief that they can thereby avoid man's previous mistakes.

Some of these interpretations of history are exceedingly far-fetched, simplistic and often quite irritating.

It is difficult for many in my generation to take seriously a 21 year-old who criticizes our government officials as "war lords". We know that the military-industrial complex as he envisions it simply does not exist.

Society Perfected By Challenge

BUT I ALSO FEEL that it is one of the rights of the young to challenge this assertion, and I encourage you to do so. Only in this way can we continue to perfect our society and our government.

What everyone can, and must do, however, is to talk to groups of students such as yourselves, and convince you that we love our country . . . not out of habit, but out of a day-to-day effort to improve it. We must make

Three Receive Distinguished Service Awards

THREE ALUMNI were honored at Congress for their outstanding service and contribution to the Fraternity. Distinguished Service plaques were presented to Robert Cody, Theta Delta at the Congressional Banquet, and in absentia to Brothers Joe Rice Dockery and Herman C. Krannert.

This is the first time that three awards have been presented in one year. The Council felt that each of the Brothers nominated had served the fraternity long and in such outstanding measure that an injustice would be done to ignore anyone of the three.

Brother Cody, initiated by the University of Florida chapter on February 14, 1937, was honored for his outstanding service to and effort on behalf of the Theta Delta chapter and the Florida Chi Phi Association. Brother Cody was instrumental in achieving a new chapter house for Theta Delta and devoted many hours to raising the funds necessary to build the house, which was dedicated last

He recently served on the Chi Phi Look Forward Committee which studied Chi Phi's future role and recommended important changes in the laws and structure of the Fraternity.

Cody is President of the Cody Publishing Company. Kissimmee, Florida.

Brother Joseph R. Dockery, initiated by the Cornell University chapter on November 20, 1925, is well known to many graduates of the last six or seven years, and to many older alumni for he visited many chapters and clubs during his tenure on the Council and as Grand Alpha from 1965-1969.

The award cannot be presented to an alumnus while serving as a Grand Officer, therefore, the Council presents the award for past service.

Brother Dockerv promoted the development of many new chapters during his presidency and the strong position of Chi Phi today is testimony to his leadership.

Dockery owns and operates, Dockery Farms, in-Mississippi, and is currently president of the American Rice Council.

Brother Herman C. Krannert has been devoted to Chi Phi since the day he was initiated into Chi Phi as the first member of the University of Illinois chapter on May 17, 1912.

This year (1970) he created the Krannert Leadership Development project through a gift to the Chi Phi Educational Trust. His vision will benefit Chi Phi for many years.

you understand that our generation has done our best, and is still hard at work, to achieve many of the same goals in which you believe.

In fact, if your generation and mine, working together, can achieve this kind of understanding and appreciation of each others' motives, I would say we would have restored the true educational process to our colleges, because I think a workable definition of education would be the process by which one learns that his teachers were part of the younger generation not too long ago . . . that he will be part of the older generation not too long from now . . . and that all of us are involved in the struggle to make some sense out of human existence, and to do some kind of good for our fellow man.

As student leaders within the "Establishment" of the University, yours is a very special responsibility. It is up to you... more than to anyone else... to help bridge the gap which exists between my generation and yours. You have the slightly unenviable task of translating the impossible demands of some of your contemporaries into workable plans of action which we can all accept. You will have to bear the stigma of being identified with students who disrupt classes and even burn buildings . . . and this will make your job even more difficult.

But, on the other hand, think what a tremendously inspiring challenge you face. You have the potential to be architects of tomorrow's America . . . perhaps even tomorrow's world. You are the innovators, the inventors who will be able to mold the shape of the future into the forms demanded by your ideals.

I would issue only one warning.

In the motion picture "A Man for All Seasons", a confrontation takes place between a voung man and Sir Thomas Moore. The young man, eager to achieve change and eradicate injustice overnight, compares the law to a dense forest in which many people lose their way, and which restricts everyone's freedom. He says he wants to cut down the trees to allow people to move

Krannert Gift Underwrites Chapter Leadership Development Program

"Tremendous, do it every year" summarized the reaction of the chapter leaders attending the three day conference which preceded the 1970 Congress. The sponsor of the idea, Brother Herman C. Krannert, Sigma '12, desires and hopes that the schooling effort would, "prepare chapter leaders to better under-

stand their leadership role.

The Leadership Development Program was made possible through a gift of money from Brother Herman C. Krannert, Indianapolis, Indiana and a group of Chi Phi alumni and friends who saw the wisdom and need for such a program. To be called the Herman C. Krannert Leadership Development Program, it will be held annually. The 1971 Leadership Development Conference will be held in August at Morgantown, West Virginia, on the campus of the West Virginia University.

Brother Krannert gave the gift to the Trustees with the stipulation that his gift be matched by a like amount, and that the income from the principle be used to defray an annual leadership conference

to be held prior to Congress.

Other major contributors to the fund are Brother and Mrs. William Akers, H'40, of Ormond Beach, Florida; Langdon Quin, G'42, Atlanta, Ga.; Merritt Truax, ED'33, Salem, Oregon; and Herbert Wilkinson, Pi'17, DeWitt, Iowa and Victor D. Smith, AThX '36, Omaha, Nebr. Mrs. Akers presented the gift in memory of her Father, John E. Oliver, who had been Chairman of The Chi Phi Educational Trust for 15 years prior to his death.

more freely.

Moore replies that the trees serve another, altogether different purpose. He says they keep Britain from being blown away and washed into the sea. Cut down the trees, and you are plunged into anarchy.

I can give you no better advice than to tell you that our society is a great deal like that forest. If you do not like the way things are, plant new trees . . . but do not yield to the temptation to cut down the forest . . . for you may never get a chance to start again.

But I am confident as I look at vou today that the future of our country, and our fraternity, is in worthy hands. I know that you will continue to practice the ideals of brotherhood which mean so much to us.

I am sure that under vour direction, and that of young people like vou all over the country, America will continue to grow and prosper, will continue to fulfill her great destiny. I am extremely proud of you . . . and I wish you good luck and Godspeed.

Thank you very much.

College campus in Atlanta early in September. Eighty Chi Phi undergraduates participated. Several Deans, including Garth Jenkins of Auburn University and Don NeSmith of the University of Georgia, attended as observers and voiced the hope that other fraternities might adopt similar programs.

Dr. E. T. Eggers, director of the Graduate Program for the Management Department at Georgia State University, School of Business Administration, Atlanta, Ga. organized the program contents and as-

sembled the teaching staff.

The National Director and Dr. Eggers felt that the instructors should avoid any reference to the "nuts and bolts" of fraternity operation. Dr. Eggers in his introduction remarks said, "Anv good leader must be able to render decisions concerning the people and things which are placed under the jurisdiction; he must be able and willing to delegate to his subordinates concerning the decisions which he has made; and he must be able and willing to communicate in such a way that he can achieve the desired results."

"Any manager works within the organizational structure. Such a structure will always consist of at least three things: the functions or kinds of work which must be done, plus the human faculties necessary to do these kinds of work plus the physical factors would be used by the human faculties

in carrying out their assigned functions."

"A major problem for leaders today is to instill or to aid motivational factors. The American people enjoy such a high standard of living that it is difficult to get organizational members motivated unless they become involved in the structure itself."

The topics presented and the names of the teaching staff were: "The Essence of Leadership," Dr. E. T. Eggers; "Motivating Ourselves and Others," Dr. Michael H. Mescon; "Problem Solving for the Leader," Dr. Leon Robertson; "Communicating with Others," Dr. James E. Chapman; "How to Make Progress on Purpose," Dr. David Schwartz; and "Dynamics of Change," Dr. Robert M. Fulmer. All of the staff members are associated with Georgia State University School of Business Administration, Atlanta.

A further feature of the conference was a two hour closed session on topics or areas of interest to the conference bearing on the welfare of the fraternity. The session was open only to those men at the conference who would be delegates to Congress.

Not all was work. The entire assembly had a pleasant late afternoon and evening at the University Yacht Club on Lake Lanier as the guest of Brothers Langdon Quin, G '42, Commodore of the Club, Lamar Swift, H '36, Bob Martin, G '31, John Raine, Ome '38, Bob Watkins, H '53, Dr. Ben Read, X '32, and Bates Block, G '40. Activities included water skiing swimming, boat rides, eating and conversation.

The Florida Chi Phi Association

A New Dimension in a Fraternal Alumni Association

THE FLORIDA Chi Phi Association was incorporated on March 16, 1943, to serve as the alumni association of the Chi Phi Fraternity which had previously been chartered on the University

of Florida campus in 1935.

For 25 years, the Florida Chi Phi Association functioned solely as the alumni association of the Theta Delta Chapter. This function included the raising of funds for acquiring and maintaining the fraternity house on the University of Florida campus. A real highlight for the Association came about this past May when the new chapter house was completed and dedicated. The house is owned and financed by the Association, leased to the Chapter and represents the finest fraternal facility on the University of Florida

The active participants in the Florida Chi Phi Association have been proud of what they have accomplished over the years. However, in the past couple of years, we became conscious of the fact that we were organized and were raising funds as a state organization. This was fine through 1967 since the University of Florida had the only active Chi Phi Chapter in the state. Thereafter, however, other chapters were chartered in the state and we quickly realized we could properly fulfill our mission as a state organization only if we began to incorporate these new

chapters into our operation.

Accordingly, the Association has begun to branch out in an aggressive manner to help the two new chapters at Florida State University and Florida Institute of Technology, and further, will plan to bring into the fold any additional chapters that may be chartered in the years to come. The initial activity began with the officers of the Association developing rapport with the officer groups of each of the new chapters, becoming familiar with their situations, their needs and learning of areas where the Association could best assist them. Concurrently, the actives of the three Florida Chapters began to develop rapport among themselves. During the recent Congress in Atlanta, this rapport and spirit advanced to the point that the actives decided to establish a state-wide program among the three schools and arrange for periodic gettogethers to exchange ideas on such things as how to handle rush, alumni relations, etc. The furthering of this kind of spirit, not only among the actives, but at the alumni level as well,

is what we hope to engender.

As a part of this program, we have already done several things, including requesting special donations from alumni throughout the state for each of the three chapters concurrent with our annual solicitation of alumni association dues. As a result of this program, the Association was recently able to give each of the three chapters slightly over \$100 each as a small gift toward some of their special needs and motivate certain alums to make other direct gifts for worthwhile projects. Furthermore, as a result of consultations among the Association officers and the officers of the active chapters, we have arranged to form liaison groups between the Association and the active chapters. Such a committee already existed for the Theta Delta Chapter, since the formation of this type of committee was required for raising money for its new house.

We have now accomplished our objective of establishing similar committees for Xi Delta, headed by John Clements. Th D '54 and Nu Delta, headed by Lee Everhart, A'49. Each of these Brothers resides near the chapter he represents and will be available along with other representatives of the committees to consult with the chapters as requested. They will try to help their chapters in their development and will be active in any fund raising activities that may come about when the time is right for the Association to construct new and better facilities on their campuses. Furthermore, these groups will be the host committees when Association meetings are held in their area. In this regard, I might mention all Association meetings have heretofore been held at the Theta Delta Chapter House. In the spring of 1971, the Association meeting will be held at Xi Delta and in years thereafter the fall meetings will be rotated between FSU and Florida dependent on the home team in the annual Florida-Florida State "slugfest.

The members of the Florida Chi Phi Association realize their purpose is no longer solely to serve the Theta Delta Chapter, but rather to serve our

three Florida chapters with equal effort and intensity and to do all possible to further the name of Chi Phi throughout the State of Florida, even to the point of being instrumental in developing further chapters in this great State—A. C. Warrington IV. President, Florida Chi Phi Association.

Show competition included over 1900 entrees submitted for judging by 600 magazines including Look, Redbook, Holiday, American Heritage, Esquire and Town and Country.


Freedom Booklet is Published by Hackett

ALTHOUGH Brother Gregory L. Wilcox of Rho '70, never achieved the Sparks Memorial Medal, he graduated Cum Laude and was tapped by Phi Beta Kappa. He was second to Thomas J. LaConte, Rho '70, the winner in both 1968-69 and 1969-70. Brother LaConte also graduated Cum Laude and Phi Beta Kappa. Rho chapter, Lafayette College, is the first chapter in many years to boast of two Phi Beta Kappas.

The Sparks Memorial Medals were first awarded in 1925, in honor of Edwin Erle Sparks, who was President Emeritus of Pennsylvania State College at the time of his death in 1924. He was one of the great Chi Phis, and contributed generously of his time and talents to his fraternity as well as to the world of education.

Upon the adoption of a resolution introduced by Brother Alfred H. Hutchinson, the Congress of 1924 authorized the medal, the design of which is symbolic. The bar pin bears the fasces of Hobart Order. The medal is suspended by a scarlet and blue ribbon, the colors being identical with those which were affixed to the charters granted by the Hobart Order. The medal itself is an embossed replica of the old Princeton pin

and bears the symbolic swords and stars of the Southern Order. On the bar is a Greek word which means "Learning acquired by education."

This medal is awarded to the man in each chapter who has attained the highest scholastic standing for that year. The only stipulation in connection with this award is that the winner shall have been a member of the chapter during the entire school year. The faculties of the various colleges select the winners, and extracurricular activities are not considered except in case of a tie.


fected in the course of one or two years.


The most significant development of the year was the establishment of the Herman C. Krannert Leadership Development program. Brother Krannert established the fund with a gift of \$15,000.00. Other major gifts to the Leadership fund were contributed by Brother and Mrs. William Akers, Jr., Eta '40, Ormond Beach, Florida; Brother Merritt Truax, Epsilon Delta '33, Salem, Oregon; and Brother Herbert Wilkinson, Pi (Iowa State) '17, DeWitt, Iowa. The leadership fund now totals over \$33,000.00. The first Leadership Seminar sponsored through the grant was conducted at Oglethorpe College, Atlanta, Georgia, in September 1970. The program is more fully described in an article on page 7.

The new Chairman of the Chi Phi Educational Trust is Brother Freeman Strickland, Omega '25, Brother Strickland is a retired Vice-President of the First National Bank of Atlanta. A long time Trustee, he was elevated to the chairmanship following the death

of Brother John E. Oliver.

The Board of Governors of the Educational Trust recently elected Brother Jack C. Fraser, Eta '43, of Atlanta, to replace Brother Rutherford Ellis who died in 1969. Brother Fraser is Chairman of the Board of Genuine Parts Corporation of Atlanta and well qualified to serve as an administrator of the Trust.

The other Trustees are: Brothers Henry G. Gildner, Alpha-Tau '24, partner Manley, Bennett McDonald and Company, Detroit; Wallace M. Jensen, Kappa '29, retired partner Touche, Ross & Company, Detroit; and Bates Block, Gamma '40 and Eta '42, Attornev associated with Hansell, Post, Brandon and Dorsey, of Atlanta. The Trustees normally meet two to three times annually.

The annual audit of the Trust for the year ending July 31, 1970 continues to reflect a steady growth in assets. The report does not account for all of the Krannert gift and the matching funds. A portion of the gifts will be recorded in the fiscal accounting year

starting August 1, 1970.

The Trust continued to expand its involvement in the traditional areas. The following capsule reports summarize the various activities:

STUDENT LOANS: Thirty-seven students have been granted loans during the past 18 months. Mostly the loans are granted to junior and senior brothers who have had emergencies develop. A typical situation is prolonged illness in the family, accompanied by large outlays for medical treatment.

Scholarships: Since January 1, 1969, the Trustees have awarded 18 scholarships in the amount of \$4,900.00. The smallest award was \$25.00, the largest \$750.00. Any Chi Phi may apply for a scholarship. The Trustees present the awards to applicants having definite financial need, however, need only is not sufficient. The applicant must be a better than average student with a good record of accomplishment in non-curricular activities as well.

LIBRARY DEVELOPMENT: A good reference library in every chapter is the goal of this program. Since its inception two years ago the following books have been donated to each chapter. Random House Dictionary, Rogets Thesaurus, Columbia Encyclopedia, Etiquette by Emily Post, and Fraternity Management Development Handbook. Additional reference works will be presented each year.

STUDY AND LIBRARY FACILITIES FOR SELECTED CHAPTERS: Each year the Trustees award grants to chapters for the development or the improvement of a library area or special study facility in the chapter house. During the past year Rho (Lafayette College); Theta Delta (Univ. of Florida) and Phi (Amherst College), created special study facilities in the chapter house which were partially financed by grants from the Trust. The typical grant has been \$350 to \$500.

Loans for Housing and Housing Improvements: A very large portion of the funds of the Trust is invested in first and second mortgage loans on chapter house properties. Chapters that have benefited from loans since the last published report are: Alpha-Tau (Michigan), Pi Delta (West Virginia), Omicron Delta (Miami Univ. of Ohio), Tau (Alabama), Theta Delta (Univ. of Fla.), Nu Delta (Florida State), and Xi Delta (Florida Institute of Technology).

In this period of tight money and high interest the Trust has been an important and sometimes the only available source of funds to both the established and the new chapters.

HELP Now NEEDED: Requests for student loans are at an all time high. The shortage of summer jobs, rising unemployment and a tight money situation have created critical money shortages for many students. The result has been that the Trustees have had to turn down some requests in the past two months and limit the amount loaned to others. The normal flow back of funds from outstanding loans is normal but not adequate to meet present requests. Therefore, a gift to the Trust will help an undergraduate brother immediately and at the same time give you a tax deductible item before the end of 1970.

Chi Phis will travel about 35 miles to Chatham County on a weekly basis for one hour two afternoons per week to work with primarily black students.
